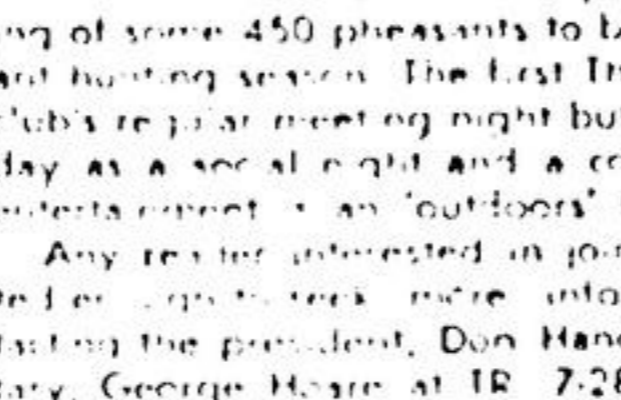

SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

In my last article I would like to mention something of the two sportsman's clubs in Georgetown for those readers who may not know of their existence. First and probably best known, there is the Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Association which had its beginnings quite a few years ago and over the years has accumulated a membership of forty sportsmen. This active club has constructed its own log cabin type clubhouse of trees cut from the property which abuts on Hickory Falls side road, and the members are now in the process of building their own rifle range at the back of the lot, for large and small bore rifles.



The club includes in its present list of projects the raising of some 450 pheasants to be released just prior to pheasant hunting season. The last Thursday of every month is the club's regular meeting night but they set aside the last Thursday as a social night and a coupon part of their monthly entertainment is an "outdoors" film.

I was also a member of the Try, Try Again club when it came to fishing and a friend of mine, Al Burke, gave me tips on how to catch a fish. The fish I caught lately at the dam by the Delta Golf Course River Drive. Of the six, two measured 15 1/2" and weighed 2 1/2 pounds. Another weighed 2 1/2 pounds but was shorter and fatter. The other three were from 12 to 14 inch.

Al tells me they were as nice to eat as they were to catch. Lately they have been taking a No. 2 Mepps spinner and one that Al caught took a small black and brown fly. But anyone who has lots of patience should do all right with a worm if they cover the hook well and don't keep removing it from the water. Your luck will probably increase a ton if you watch your line closely since some trout will take your line, move it a few feet, then sit there, and if you are not watching it very closely you'll never know it moved.

A word of caution to the young fishermen, however, if you want to try your luck from the bridge or from the walls of the dam keep both feet on the ground and stay well back of the edge so you'll be able to come back and try your luck again.
