Camelot, My Fair Lady Booked For O'Keefe Centre

In Toronto, these days, thousands of visitors and patrons congregate daily on the diagonally opposite corner of Yonge and Broad Streets to watch the busy workmen unearthing the city's new theatre for the performing arts and raising this \$12,000,000 project to completion.

Management and box office staffs have already moved into office space and rehearsals of the operas, "Camelot" are scheduled to begin September 1961.

Costs of the theatre will take almost \$100,000,000. Apart from boxes and press seats, it's already indicated that official opening arrangements will be sponsored by a number of Toronto's charitable organizations. Altogether more than 10,000 theatre memberships have been accepted by the new O'Keefe Centre, ensuring a large segment of Toronto and district — and some Ontario — performing arts fans 1961-62 season subscriptions.

Local Missions At Stake Founding

A new "unit" — the Mormon equivalent of a diocese — was organized on Sunday when members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints met in the Union Carlton Theatre for the purpose of this historic event.

Attending the meeting were Jack Barchler and Lynn Smith, who recently came to Georgetown to spend several months as missionaries of the church. Among speakers were Elder Mark Peterson of Salt Lake City, Utah, a member of the Council of 12 Apostles for the church. A noted speaker and writer he is president of the Desert News Publishing Co. in Salt Lake City and a vice president of the Mormon Church Corporation.

Mr. Peterson, who directs missionary work in Ontario, is also a newspaper man, on leave of absence from the Desert News Press, which serves in this area.

Some 11,000 missionaries carry the church's work throughout the world, many of them young men like Mr. Barchler and Mr. Peterson, both of whom are university graduates, who train the means of serving their church.

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Seek Solution As Milton Needs \$24,000 To Finish High School

District Now Disbanded Adds To Cost Problem

No conclusions were reached when municipal representatives from Acton, Georgetown, Milton, Nassauwagaya and Esquimaux met in Stewarttown Hall on Tuesday evening of last week to discuss financing of a deleterious shortage on high school construction funds.

With Wilfred Ford acting as chairman, K. C. Lindsay read a letter, similar to one directed to all the municipalities that were in the former North Halton High School District Board that was dissolved at the end of 1959.

The letter from county treasurer Miss Margaret Maston pointed out that the North Halton District Board had requested the county for \$715,000 for the buildings in Acton and Georgetown. The county assessed debtors totaling \$720,000 at a rate of 98 1/2 and paid the district \$716,334.98, an amount \$1,334.09 in excess of the request.

The North Halton District requested the county for \$430,000 and the county issued debentures for \$435,000 selling \$185,000 on the Canadian market at 93 1/2 and \$250,000 on the American market at 94. Deduction of the discount and ex-

cess of the assessment, on which costs of operation are levied, than either Milton or Georgetown, despite a per capita pupil attendance similar to the other area.

Mr. Brown also noted that present indications were that Georgetown would have to add rooms in 1962, Acton in 1966 and Milton in 1970.

He suggested that since Milton would have no new capital expenditures for 10 years, they should ask for an amount less than the \$23,182.41.

Councillor Ian Cass, Georgetown, inquired from Mr. Brown if the other municipalities had to pay the amount to the Milton District Board. Mr. Brown noted they did, according to the Municipal Act.

Hevee John Greer, Acton suggested it seemed the municipalities were bound to pay the amount. He suggested Acton didn't want to pay it but it would be better to get it paid and deal with some of the other points of dissatisfaction such as boundaries. He suggested the possibility that Acton and Milton might consider a joint area as had been originally operated until Georgetown wanted to join.

There were a number of speakers and a review of the solution with no conclusions reached and no further meetings planned.
