ESQUEQUIO COUNCIL

Claim Car Wrecking Yard Should Be Licensed

A letter from Mr. and Mrs. Charles Miller, of Toronto, who have a summer cottage in the district sparked a discussion at Esquequing Council Monday. They claimed that demolished cars blotted out the beauty in the area, and depreciated values. The letter concluded with Mr. Miller asking if a license and a fence were not requirements of the by-law.

Clerk K. C. Lindsay stated there never had been a license granted. "We couldn't license it anyway," stated the reeve, "until the property is in proper shape and fenced by a six foot high closed fence."

Town Freight Yard Is Key In Planned Terminal Project

Georgetown's freight yards will play a key part in the new Toronto terminal project which is slated for completion by 1965.

Speaking to a hearing of the Ontario Municipal Board last week, J. L. Camm, project director for the CNR said the present one-line track would be ripped up and replaced with a heavy-duty line over

which some 25 trains would be funnelled from the "Niagara Gateway" — Buffalo, Niagara, Sarnia and London, daily.

He said the freights would be rerouted from Hamilton to Georgetown and switched here to the Vaughan Township marshalling yards. The project will mean extensive expansion of present local yard facilities.

With the gloom that Montrealers tell a tale on Toronto, or Vancouverites tell one on Victoria, Clerk K. C. Lindsay of Esquequing told this one to Council. this one, and I paid double the taxes."


