### Halton Courts Miss Psychiatrists' Aid

Halton County courts are "seriously handicapped" by withdrawal of provincial psychiatric help, Magistrate K. M. Langdon said last week.

He has recommended that Halton County Health Unit engage its own psychiatrist for the examination of prisoners awaiting sentence.

Recently Magistrate Langdon was informed by authorities of Ontario Hospital, Hamilton, that the service of government-employed psychiatrists there would no longer be available.

"The only way they will take these cases," he said, "is if they are actually committed for examination."

Magistrate Langdon would not say whether or not the county was "likely to retain its own psychiatrist." "We are still working on it," he declared.

More than any other magistrate in Ontario, Magistrate Langdon made use of Ontario Hospital psychiatric services in connection with persons convicted and awaiting sentence in courts in Burlington and elsewhere in the county. Magistrate Langdon first made known the decision of the hospital authorities in the course of a trial at Milton.
