### Hi Sportsmen!

Georgetown Anglers and Hunters voted at their last business meeting, to release the pheasants they have been raising for the last few months, at the earliest possible time.

HARVEY COPLAND, who had the pheasants housed in a coop at the back of his lot, told the attending members of the club that the birds were getting too tame, and he was afraid if they were kept much longer, they might not have enough time to regain their natural wildness before pheasant season opens.

It was also voted that the birds would be released in groups of 25, at locations to be determined at that time. These locations will be published at a later date along with any others where pheasants have been sighted in Halton County.

The 150 pheasants that the club was raising at BILL BENNETT'S farm, on the 8th line at the 22nd sideroad, were released during the first week of August.

Local hunters, who hope to hunt the pheasants and other game, are reminded they must take a "Hunter's Safety Course" if they did not have a hunting license LAST YEAR. Any hunting license obtained in Ontario will serve this purpose.
