## Whole Milk For Welfare Agencies

The government has authorized the Agricultural Products Board to make available for international welfare purposes through approved international relief agencies a quantity of whole milk powder purchased by the Board as part of the program for the utilization of surplus dairy products. The whole milk powder will be made available to these organizations by the Board in consultation with the Department of External Affairs whose offices are co-ordinated with the various international relief programs. An initial donation of approximately 100 million pounds is being made available to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund for immediate shipment to twelve countries. Because of its better fat content whole milk powder is one of the commodities most urgently requested by international welfare agencies to assist them in carrying out their welfare programs, particularly in the underdeveloped countries.

## Halton M.P. Sandy Best Praises Medical Report

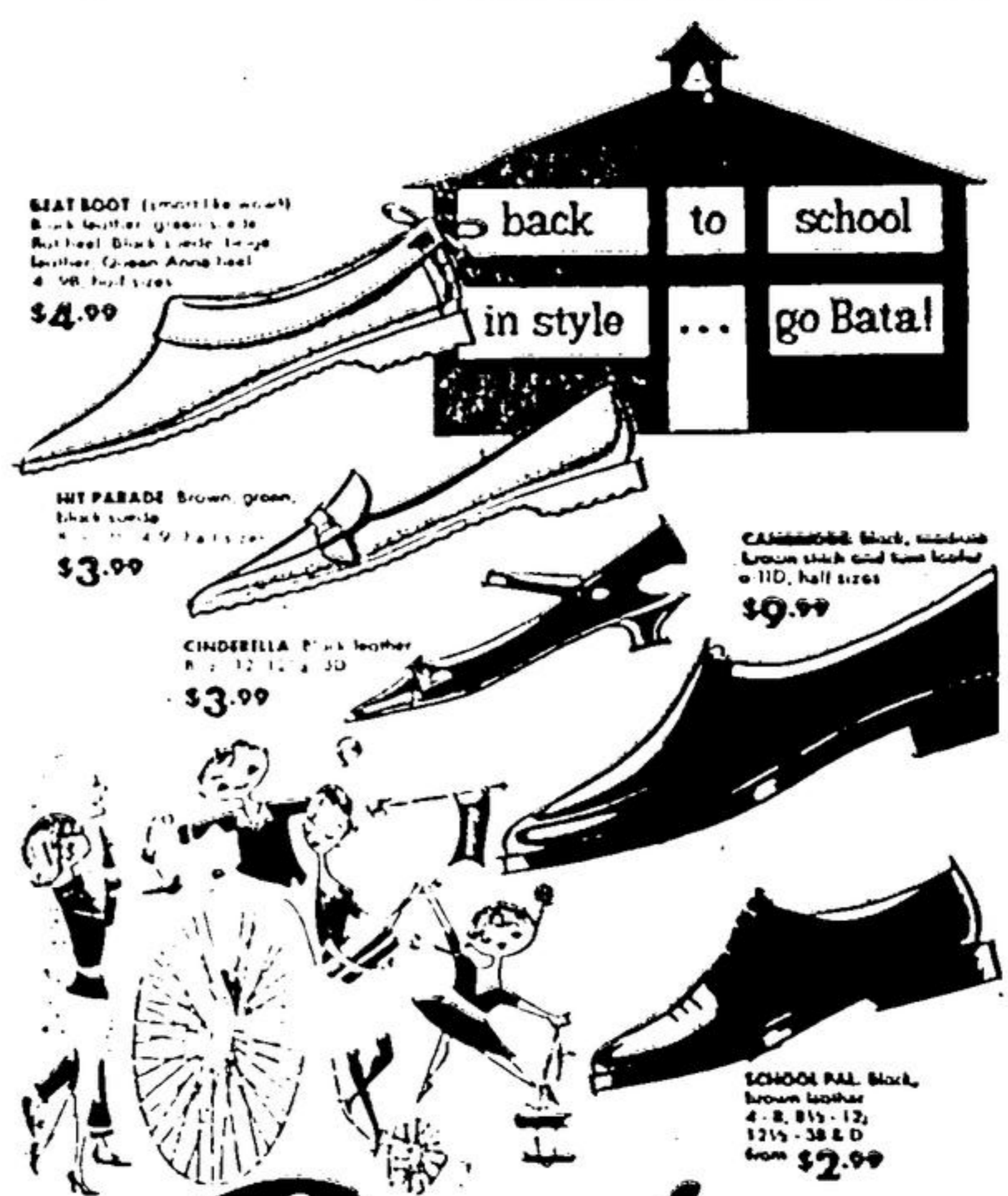
### Calls It A Milestone In Medical Research

On August 16th, Alexander "Sandy" Best, M.P. for Halton County, addressed the House of Commons on the Estimates of the National Research Council, in a speech which contained 4 significant points. (a) Research expenditure by the Government of Canada, through the National Research Council, has approximately doubled in the last three years. (b) Grants to universities for scholarships and research projects have been greatly increased and will continue to be increased rapidly. (c) Dr. Farquharson's report is a most important contribution to the problem of medical research in Canada. Main recommendations which should be rapidly implemented include: the establishment of a national research coordinating committee, an initial budget of four million dollars for the proposed Medical Research Council and 27 million dollars for medical research building construction and research facilities. The House of Commons Research Committee should be reconstituted as soon as possible to continue its work. The following is Mr. Best's address: Mr. Chairman, I should like to make a few remarks on this vote for the national research council. I think few Canadians would question the fundamental importance of research and increased research activity in this country. I have always felt that in a small country like Canada with our problems of export, imports, and the use of our vast store of natural resources, research on a per capita basis is even more important than in many other lands around the world. Like the hon. member for Humbler - St. George's, I would certainly hope that our committee on research which was set up this year, and which had a few meetings, could be set up again at an early date next session in order that we might continue our work of examining the national research council and other bodies involved in research in this country. There is very much that remains to be done in the way of increasing and sponsoring research by the government of Canada. Nevertheless, I am proud, and I am sure other members of our party are proud of the very important and creditable record of our government in the last three years in the field of government sponsored research. Speaking from memory, if my recollection is correct our grants to the national research council for instance have about doubled during the period from 1956 or 1957 until 1960. This year we are talking of a sum in the neighbourhood of \$33 million, which is a vast increase in such a short period of time and will certainly provide a stimulus to research in this country. A part of this increase is in a very important field, that is the area of scholarships and grants in aid to universities. Universities are a natural training ground for students, graduates, fellows and teachers, and as a result of the

three of them, first there is the establishment of a separate medical research council under terms similar to those of the national research council. I am hopeful this recommendation will prevail with the government and that the Minister of Trade and Commerce and the Minister of Finance will recommend the establishment of this separate body in the near future. There are several other recommendations that are worthy of note. For instance, there is the one that an interdepartmental medical research co-ordinating committee be set up to integrate the activities in medical research presently being carried on in the department of health and welfare, the department of veterans affairs and the defence research board. There are recommendations involving finances to be used for the purpose of medical research, some of which relate to the budget of this proposed new council itself. There is mention of the sum of \$4 billion for this purpose, and then a reference to the large amounts of \$25 million and \$12 million respectively for new medical schools and for research facilities in hospitals. These amounts total approximately \$40 million in all and would provide a tremendous stimulus for medical research in our country. I was most interested in seeing the tables in Dr. Farquharson's report indicating government expenditures devoted to medical research in Canada, which in one column are expressed as percentages of the gross national product. 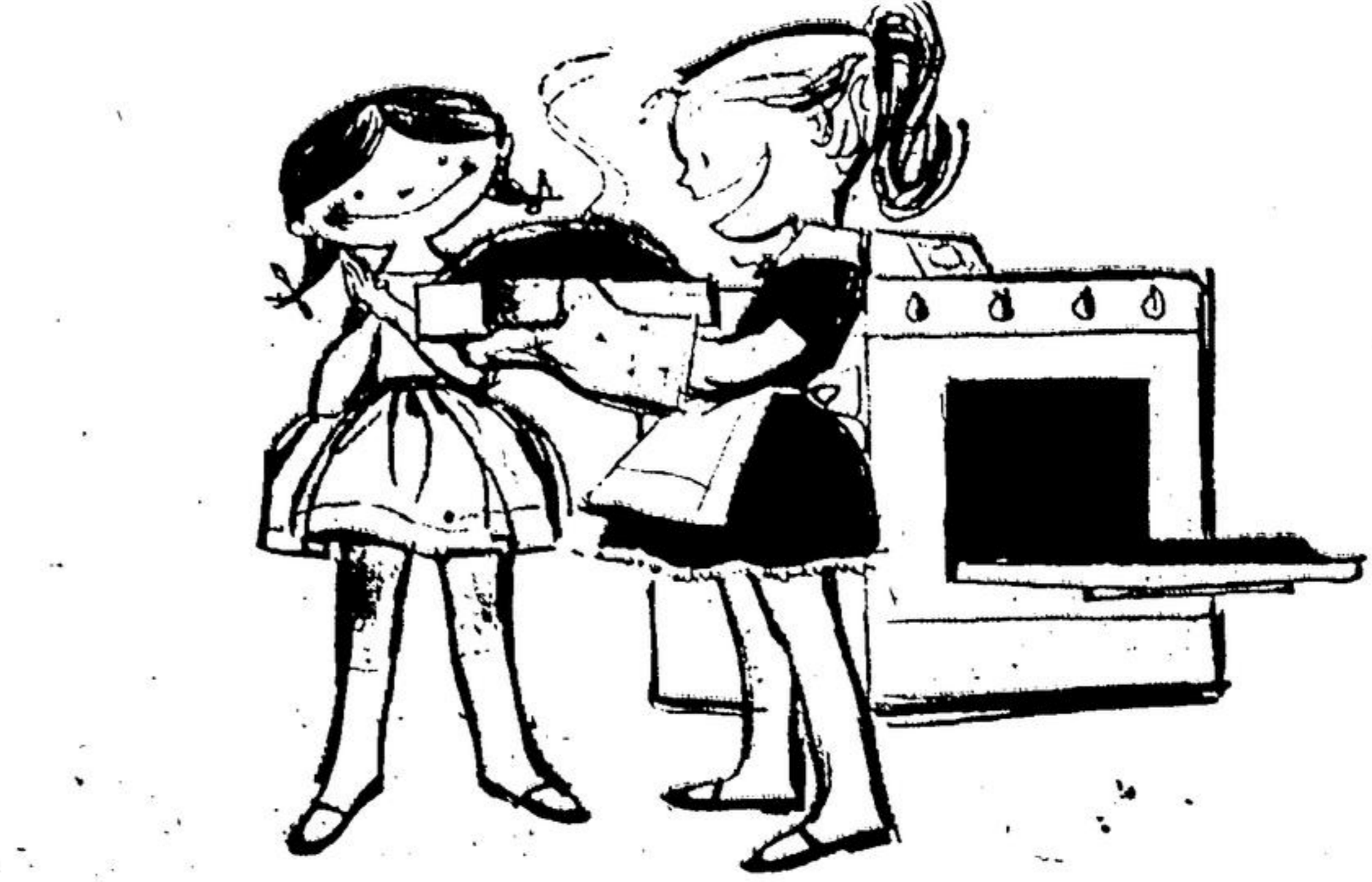
