Mr. Clark is a director of the Grand Valley Car Club, and treasurer of the Canadian Racing Drivers Association, an association open only to actual drivers.

He drives a production Austin Healey, "souped up" a bit of course. Only the inside of the car can be changed, structurally the car has to be left as it came from the factory. The as yet unbeaten Austin Healey is never driven to the different tracks at Hawarden and Green acres in Ontario, St. Eugene near Montreal, and Watkins Glen, New York.
