Council Confused Zoning By-Law Motion is Vetoed

WHAY COUNCIL DID

Will Place Warning Signs For Motorists On Princess Anne Dr.

A letter from the Public School Board expressing concern for the safety of children walking on Princess Anne Drive evoked action. Signs will be erected warning motorists of school children in the area and more police supervision at school hours will be suggested to the Chief. However, the matter of a sidewalk will be left with the Road Committee to estimate the cost. "It probably won't be done this year," commented the mayor. "While we're at it," chimed in Coun Harrison, "why not ask the School Board to erect a fence between the town park and the Park School. They tore the old one down."

The matter of the fence will be left to the Property Committee to consult with the School Board.

"The completed roads in East Georgetown are not too satisfactory," admitted Dept. Reeve W. Gray. "The heavily travelled streets are not standing up as we had hoped," he added.

The Dept. of Highways lay down specifications for a certain type of gravel, the mayor stated, and it's impossible to make a good gravel road out of the materials they are demanding. Furthermore," he contended, "the gravel they approve costs more than twice as much as the gravel we used on Hewson Cres, which is now a good road."

It was decided to put another coat of asphalt prime on the worst spots. In addition a letter will be sent to the Department of Highways expressing council's views on the gravel specifications and the costs involved.

"Our interpretation was not in accordance with the Planning Board who drew it up," stated Coun. Cass.

"The Planning Board is very unhappy at the arbitrary action of Council," claimed Mr. Cass, "and have requested permission to go over this paragraph. If we are not satisfied after the Planning Board has dealt with it, that is the time to discuss it," he concluded.

Councillor F. Harrison launched into one of his pet subjects. "I was under the impression Council, an elected body, responsible to the people, set up these boards to help us, not govern us. Mr. Cass tried to interrupt but the mayor rapped for order. "Council showed what it wanted, but it did not meet the approval of the Planning Board," Mr. Harrison concluded.

"I support the views of the Planning Board," Coun. J. Gunn stated firmly. "I have great respect for the men on it, and the work they have put into it. The only thing to do is to go back, and start from scratch. After all the Planning Board is more qualified than council in this matter."

"I disagree," retorted the mayor. "Council is directly responsible to the people."

"I too, am opposed to the motion," affirmed Coun. W. Hunter. "The Planning Board wants every case taken to the Committee of Adjustment, that costs \$25 every time. Besides, it says, 'With the consent of council.' So let's leave it the way it is."

The recorded vote showed the motion defeated 5 to 4, with Gunn, Sargent, Cass, and Elliott opposed.

High School Addition Probable By 1963; Figures Indicate Growth

Present Enrollment 577 Could Be 740 In 3 Years

Georgetown's new high school building will be made quite by 1963.

At a meeting of the Georgetown and District High School Board meeting Monday night projected attendance figures indicated that the new school facilities for 740 pupils will have been taxed by that time and that a building program to meet the soaring enrollment will have to begin almost immediately to be ready then.

The high school enrollment this term stands at 577 and will reach 685 next term. A study of public school and separate school enrollment figures broken down into classes confirmed the necessity of additional space in the near future.

Among a number of ideas presented for the board's opinion by principal J. L. Lambert, who said he was happy with "everything but the noon hour situation" was a cafeteria. He said, "Even with the present enrollment, almost three hundred are staying at school during the lunch hour. On a fine day most of them eat their lunches outside, but in bad weather..."

A small cafeteria would accommodate everyone in two shifts should the board see fit to include it in the building program.

The high school rural bus route will be altered slightly it was decided by the board after receiving a delegation of parents requesting a route which would be more convenient for students on the 9th line.

The delegation, John Wagstaff, Bud Bishop and Roger Derro said eight pupils on the line were inconvenienced by the present route which runs from Terra Cotta to the 10th line, down the 10th line through the Glen and up Mountview Rd. They advocated a new route which would come down the 10th as far as the sidewalk above Argo Block, across there to the 9th and straight down the 9th line.

At present only one student is being picked up by the bus on the 10th line and the change would mean some inconvenience there. When it was pointed out the change would also affect the Glen students who congregated at Beaumont's Mill, vice-chairman Clarence Anderson suggested the bus leave the 9th line at the top of the Glen and come through the village. Gordon Hutt's Barn Destroyed By Fire

A fire of unknown origin which gutted an old barn near Charles St. Sunday was the most serious of three blazes which kept firemen busy this week.

The barn, on the property of G. R. Hutt, contained only a few books and papers which were being stored there and the loss, according to Fire Chief Bob Bonfield, was not financially a great one. Aided by a stiff breeze the flames gained a good foothold before firemen arrived, but the brigade had it under control in minutes. By the time it was doused only the four walls were left standing.

Five Junior Fire Brigade members assisted firemen in beating out a grass fire on the Heslop property just west of Mountview Rd. Friday.

The fire broke out at about 10 to 5 in the afternoon and was battled by firemen and helpers for an hour and a half. There was no damage.

Only the upholstery was damaged when the seat of a 1960 Fargo truck caught fire last Wednesday at the Hollywood House on Norval. The truck is owned by Hugh Ward of Brampton and the flames were discovered at about 11 p.m. Damage was estimated by Chief Bonfield at \$50.

Town Will Investigate Winter Works Program

The \$52,000 cost of the partially constructed sewage lift station and site, will actually cost the town \$28,000, it was revealed at Council.

Through a settlement with Delrex Developments, who built the lift station, the town will buy the land and lift station for \$36,000. Delrex Developments, in turn, will pay \$26,000 owed the town under a land release agreement, plus \$9,142 in back taxes.

Mayor Hyde would like the \$26,000 thus obtained, applied against the \$52,000 lift station right away, thereby reducing it to \$26,000, saving interest and financial charges. These sentiments will be conveyed to the Ontario Water Resources Commission.

A committee consisting of the chairman of public works, property, roads, and water has been set up to study the Winter Works programme. This

Local People Safe, Property Damage High in Donna's Wake

Cook Home Worst Hit In Florida Windstorm

Hurricane Donna which raked the Florida coast on the week end caused concern for a number of local people who have relatives and property there.

The most serious loss was suffered by Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Cook of R. 1, Glen Williams, whose property near Key Largo, 45 miles south of Miami took a pounding from the heavy winds and water. The roof of their southern home was ripped off by the wind and huge waves swamped the entire property washing away all their furniture. Some of it was found a quarter of a mile away. When walls were standing amid uprooted trees. The loss was partially insured.

Mrs. Ann Bitter who was in town with her sister, Miss Gladys McGibbon, and sister-in-law Mrs. Jack McGibbon, when Donna hit the eastern U.S. coast was unsuccessful in getting a report on the extent of damage to her properties at Goodland, Florida and on Long Island, also in the path of the hurricane, because of interrupted communications. She left by plane on Tuesday for New York.

Florida west coast property owned by Al Norton, 32 Victoria Street is assumed to have weathered Donna's wrath since no word has been received from there to date. The Norton property is just south of Sarasota.

Mrs. Bill Whitney phoned her parents Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Jennings Sunday to say that Bill and herself were safe. Mr. and Mrs. Whitney sat out the storm

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in their St. Petersburg home which was undamaged. Trees on the property were uprooted. Mr. and Mrs. Bob Mackenzie and their 4 daughters, Vickie, Roberta, Heather and Judy, also of St. Petersburg, stayed in their home throughout the gale and escaped injury, though they report having heard objects hitting the house during the night. Before the hurricane they secured everything they could and slept on mattresses on the floor in accordance with safety instructions. The Florida homes have no basements. Bob is a former Georgetown resident and the son of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Mackenzie formerly of Guelph Street.
