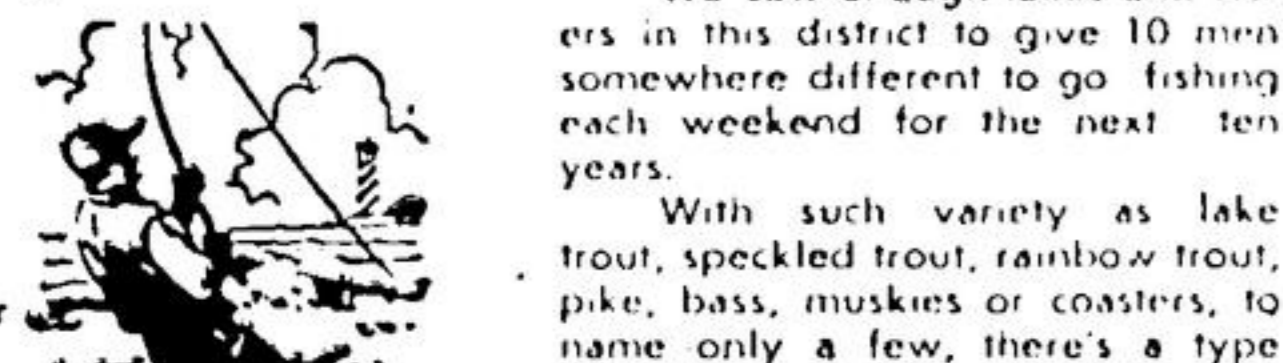

Hi, Sportsmen!

As I wrote last week George Hoare and myself went on a fishing and sightseeing trip up to the "gap," called this due to the fact that it was a gap in No. 17 Highway between White River and the Agawa Bay, that was never finished until this year.



We saw enough lakes and rivers in this district to give 10 men somewhere different to go fishing each weekend for the next ten years.

With such variety as lake trout, speckled trout, rainbow trout, pike, bass, muskies or coasters, to name only a few, there's a type of fishing to suit every fisherman who visits this district.

When a 4 or 5 lb. speckled trout is fair or a 17 lb. pike is below average, you can figure that these catches were plentiful in the spring especially.

If you look on a map of this area you might think it is too far to go on just a week end, but with such good highways to so many good fishing spots, that a 500-mile trip is within your range on a normal week-end.

My only suggestion is that if you would like to try this area next spring, that you pick out a definite place you would like to try, then find out if there are the proper facilities to suit your needs as there are quite a few lakes and rivers with both lodges and camps close at hand, and in this way you won't be disappointed by not finding a place to lodge, when you get there and have to spend all your fishing time looking for one. You can get most of this information by writing to the Dept. of Lands and Forests in Toronto. In this way you'll have a successful trip, well worth the drive and fish stories to tell and think about for years to come.

George and I were able to try a few good spots such as the Agawa River, Montreal River, Trout River and Gardiner Lake. And though we didn't have any luck ourselves we saw enough evidence in catches and pictures of fish caught this year, to warrant a lot of future trips to this area.

And after seeing such beautiful scenery and being able to line up some future trips next spring, that our trip was well worth the drive (we covered close to 1300 miles from 10 p.m. Friday to 9 p.m. Monday).
