Recently property was purchased on Maple Avenue and plans to build have been made.

Under the present circumstances the name Grace Baptist Church has suited very well, but with the new location the change was made. "The new church name," Rev. Woods explained, "will not only be an attractive title for the church but it will also serve to identify the location for newcomers." Plans for the new church building are in progress and the architects' drawings are to be completed shortly.

## Queen Elizabeth Way Soon To Be A Controlled Access Highway

Effective Friday, Sept. 16, all private automobiles, trucks and heavy trucks will be prohibited from the Queen Elizabeth Way between the intersection with Highway 10 and Highway 25. This section of the highway, which is 15.4 km. long, will be used for all service stations, such as the Duke Road and Highway 25, will be via service roads and warning signs will be posted indicating the interchanges providing access to these stations.

When these oil companies located on the Queen Elizabeth Way, one of the conditions in the agreement granting permits provided for the eventual closing of direct access to the Q.E.W.

The only exceptions are the two stations at the Q.E.W. and Highway 27 which were in operation before access restrictions were placed on this section of highway.
