## Dogs Cause Loss In Norval District

Dogs in and around Norval have caused a loss of 47 geese belonging to Mr. L. Hughes, it was disclosed at Esquasing Council. Mr. N. Stark, the livestock evaluator for the township, estimated Mr. Hughes' loss at \$188 for the purpose of reimbursement. The geese weighing between ten and twelve pounds, were attacked by three dogs who jumped the fence. A total of 185 poultry have been killed by dogs this year, according to Mr. Stark. In the event the owner of the dog cannot be identified, the township reimburses the farmer for his loss. Esquasing Road Superintendent W. Townsend, informed council that permission had been obtained from the Department of Highways to buy a new grader. A maximum cost of \$20,000 has been set, with the Department paying fifty per cent. The township has also been granted an additional \$5,000 for maintenance.
