Plans have been in the making for some months now and as the date draws near indications point to one of the best events in the long history of the society. This is the 114th consecutive fair. A very complete prize list has been offered with hard cash of dollars and cents, and any one may enter by becoming a member of the society and paying the necessary entry fees. Ladies are asked to bring along their prize exhibits of baking, fancy work flowers and vegetables for the hall display, which will be augmented by displays by Women's Institutes and from the various schools in town and district. On the grounds will be competitions between cattle breeders, poultry breeders and horse showmanship. Junior Farmers will vie for gold watches in the dairy and beef cattle commercial competitions. Georgetown Girls Pipe Band will parade and play during the afternoon. Vince Mountford will be master of ceremonies. Bernard Shows will again provide a grand midway of rides and games for both young and old, and horse racing will be the order of the day.

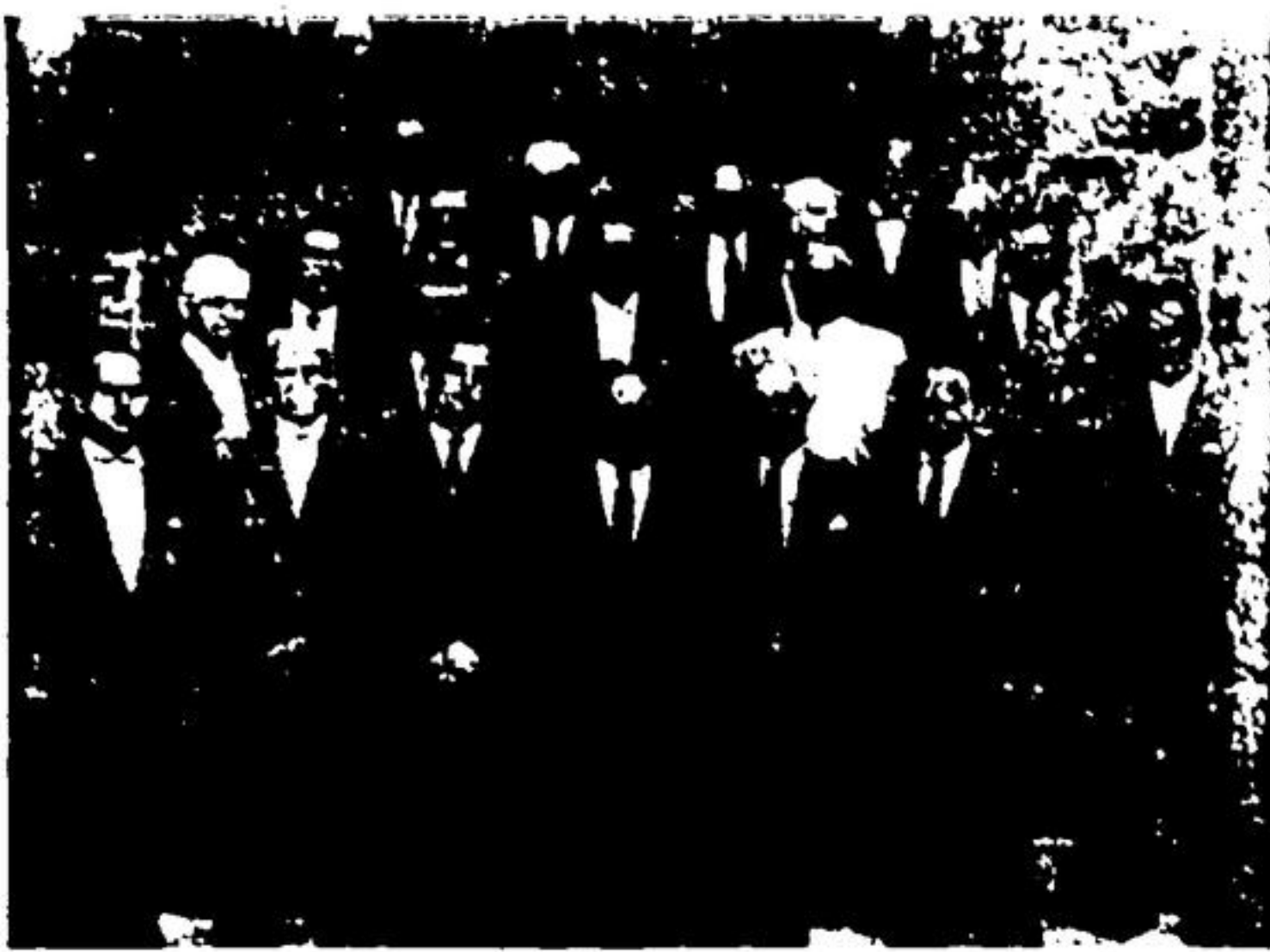
Parade to Dedication? Council Opinion Divided

Ratepayer Poses This Question For Council

"Should the polling booth remain open till 9 p.m.?" the question raised at Council meeting by Mr. Eric Beard as he presented a petition to this effect. He was appearing on behalf of the Delrex Ratepayers Association, a great many of whom had signed it. "Since many people work in Toronto they have great difficulty in reaching the polls by seven," Mr. Beard contended. He suggested that the opening hours could be later, since the morning vote is usually light. "What time would the booths be open till nine?" wondered Coun. W. Hunter. "That's the point," Mayor Hyde agreed, "however, time might be too late, possibly there can be a saw-off," he concluded. Coun. J. Gunns suggested there be one booth stay open late and those unable to vote at regular hours would register to vote at this particular polling station. Clerk C. Bonham pointed out that there was no provision in the Act for such a booth. The question will be further studied.

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Evangelistic Services Held At First Baptist Church
