Hunting Seasons Announced By Department of Lands & Forests

Open seasons for hunting in Ontario have been announced by Hon. J. W. Spower, Minister of Lands and Forests, as follows:

Pheasants
In the Counties of Brant, Bruce, Dufferin, Grey, Halton, Huron, Peel, Perth, Simcoe, Waterloo, Wellington, Wentworth, and the Townships of North Gwillimbury and Georgina in York County the open season for hunting pheasants will be from October 12 to 29. Bag limits will be three per day of which not more than one shall be a hen. Shooting is restricted to the hours between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., and rifles must not be used to hunt pheasant.

Hungarian Partridge
There will be an open season from September 24 to November 19 for Hungarian Partridge throughout Ontario, with the exception of the District of Thunder Bay. The bag limit will be 8 per day and possession limit of 10 at any one time. Hungarian partridge occur in suitable densities in southeastern Ontario, also in the Lake Erie district and the general vicinity of Swastika. Best hunting is to be had in the earlier part of the season, since the birds become wild later on.

Ruffed Grouse
The 1960 open season for hunting ruffed grouse, sharp-tailed grouse, spruce grouse, and ptarmigan will be as follows:

Now that pheasant season is drawing near, I might mention here that the pheasants the G.A.&H.A. released have been sighted in many different places throughout Halton County in recent weeks, so there should be a good number on hand when the season opens. The G.A.&H.A. released pheasants in flocks of 25 and 50 in locations such as the 10th line and 27th sideroad, Ballinacree sideroad, 9th line north of Glen Williams, the 6th line at Limehouse and near the iron bridge at Norval. Pheasants were also sighted on the 9th line north and south of the turkey shoot will be published later.

Although trout season closed last Thursday in most parts of Southern Ontario, there is still time to get in a fishing trip or two for that big one that has been eluding you all summer. With rainbow trout just starting to run in the Georgian Bay area, and Muskie hitting well at Port Severn and the Rice Lake area, and fair size pike being caught at Frenchman's Bay, don't put your rods away yet. To start cleaning, checking and oiling your guns for hunting season, just start getting your guns ready during the week nights and do a little fall fishing on the week-ends, as the middle of Sept. through the middle of Oct. has proven to be one of the best times to go after those big lunkers.
