Our homes and grounds that surround them have a warm place in our hearts, our memories, and our daily lives. To promote beauty, increase property values, and conserve natural resources, consider a tree-planting programme. Trees are basic to home grounds.

Trees that are established give a sense of age and majesty that takes years to achieve. In planning select the most suitable species for the job you wish the tree to do. Much thought and judgment should be given before deciding to cut down any established trees. On the other hand, this hesitancy to remove a damaged tree or unsightly tree, often improves improvement in many cases a replacement tree would add more to your home.

Tree planting should be a continuous programme. Replace the trees that have served their usefulness, and plant to provide beauty and utility.

If you fertilize your trees this fall, you'll be fighting poor growth, insect pests and diseases.

TODAY — AND 15 YEARS AGO

Our story this week will interest our publishers of weekly newspapers, and we hope our readers. We visited "The Beaver," the weekly newspaper of the 4th Canadian Infantry Brigade Group, and for once since arriving here found ourselves in our own element.

We sat in the editorial office at Headquarters, and we went downtown to the Soccer Arena where Herr John prints *The Beaver*. We revelled in the smell of ink and the clutter of the layout and proof sheets. The Beaver has a circulation of 10,000. It is published in the early days of Herr John's Brigade. Working with Herr John's staff are the most capable, able, and cheerful of men and women.

In Reg. 1557, British Forces, we found a man who had been in the 4th Canadian Infantry Brigade for the first time as a private. He had just completed a tour of duty in the early days of the war. The Beaver took on like a wild fire.
