

## A Revived Industry, Charcoal Topic at Hornby Institute

The coming of the outdoor barbecue has revived at least one industry, the making of charcoal. This was the topic at the September meeting of the Hornby Women's Institute, held on the 15th at the home of Mrs. Stan May. Mrs. Roy Wilson, the Canadian Industries convener, gave a most interesting paper on the making of charcoal at the South River plant.

Charcoal is made from such woods as maple, beech, ironwood and cherry, and it is about five years ago this plant found a market for the charcoal. The South River plant is the only one in Canada using the retort method, which is baking the wood at a high temperature, then cooling it.

The finest charcoal goes to the pharmaceutical trade, the next to the steel makers, some for animal feed manufacturers and still more for barbecue fuel.

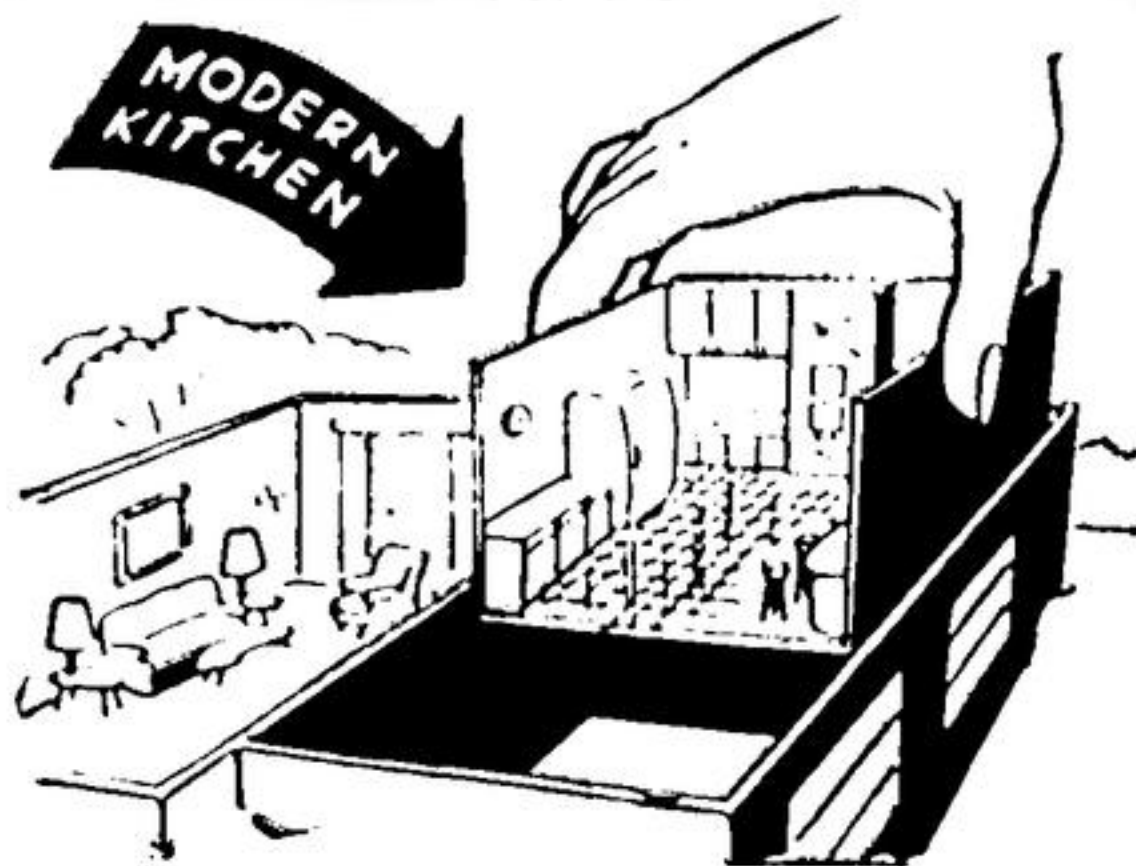
