WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Council Discusses New Cruiser
For Town Police Department**

Council accepted the resig-
nation of George M. Robertson,
probationary constable, and de-
cided to advertise for a re-
placement.

Continuing with police busi-
ness, Mayor Hyde confessed
that the Police Committee had
found the proposal to rent a
police cruiser not as attractive
as originally imagined. Con-
sequently, Coun. J. D. Kelly,
Police Chairman, had invited
two bids on a cruiser.

"How is the police commit-
tee budget?" demanded Coun.
F. Harrison. "To my knowl-
edge there was no allowance
for a new cruiser in the bud-
get. We've been warned en-
ough about the 'sausage' bud-
get," he concluded.

"The expense on this cru-
iser every month is a burden,"
opined the mayor, "possibly
we'd be farther ahead to deal
with it."

Mr. Harrison commented "It's
funny how every police cruiser
we get a lemon."
"The tenders don't bind us,"
said Mayor Hyde, "merely give
us guidance on prices." Mr.
Harrison repeated his question
about the police budget, and
Police Sergeant, finance chair-
man, replied they were about
on schedule. "But this would
put it over," insisted Mr. Har-
rison. "SA bid, probably," con-
ceded the mayor.

It was decided to hold the
sealed bids till next week. In
the meantime, the police com-
mittee will get estimates on re-
pairing the motor.
