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

### Delrex Ratepayer Berates Council's Road Program

#### Claims Tar and Chips Waste of Money

The perennial question of the condition of roads came under fire again at Monday's Council meeting. Mr. R. B. Buck of Sargent Road claimed he was disgusted with the condition of Sargent Road. The tarring and chipping was a waste of taxpayers' money," he contended. "And the dust is beyond belief."

Roads Chairman Walter Gray explained that the road should have been sealed, but the bad weather wouldn't allow it.

Mr. Buck also asked if the designation R1, R2, or R3, made a difference in assessment.

Reeve Sargent, who was Acting Mayor for the evening in the absence of Mayor Hyde, replied that it made little or no difference.

After a lengthy speech by Coun. F. Harrison regarding the need for storm sewers on Sargent Road, Mr. Buck suggested they be installed under local improvement.

"I'm afraid many people would not feel the same way," opined Coun. Cass, "since they are contributing to storm sewers in other parts of town."

Acting Mayor Sargent promised Mr. Buck everything possible would be done short of a major undertaking.

"Do any of you councillors represent the Delrex area?" demanded Mr. A. T. Marshman of Hale Drive, the next spectator to address council.

"None of us do," retorted Acting Mayor Sargent quickly.

"Can you tell me how much of Delrex' taxes are going back there in work done?" Mr. Marshman asked.

"The people are greatly dissatisfied with the services they are getting for their taxes," he went on. "It's up to the members of the Ratepayers Association to get more support," he added.

"In what way aren't you getting service?" enquired Coun. W. Hunter. "I phoned the clerk where his tax dollar goes, the works department two or three times," Marshman retorted.

### Welding Instruction Added to Curriculum

Instruction in oxy-acetylene and arc welding will be added to the Georgetown High School shop classes shortly. On the proposal of shop teacher Oscar Robb, the Georgetown District High School Board at their regular meeting Monday night carried a motion to include the welding instruction in the shop curriculum and will purchase the necessary equipment recommended by Mr. Robb.

Mr. Robb was introduced to the board by departing secretary Col. Gordon Brown and in addressing them said that some sheet metal work and welding were common in other high schools offering shop instruction.

He said the oxy-acetylene and arc welding units would cost \$226.00 and \$215.00, however, other necessary equipment, a curtain to prevent the possibility of fire and avoid distraction by the flash to the other students in the classroom, plus the cost of wiring and other materials would mean a total outlay in the neighbourhood of \$600.

This is the first year for shop classes to be offered at the Georgetown Community Centre, which has been provided as a courtesy by Mr. Mac Heriot, locally.
