The turkey hunt, October 22nd is the official date set by the turkey shoot committee for the turkey, quail and Hunters Association's annual turkey shoot.

The shoot will be for standard 22 calibre rifles and standard 12 gauge shotguns, with the club supplying the ammunition. There will also be a lucky draw to be drawn at the shoot. Draw tickets will be on sale prior to October 22nd from club members and local business establishments. They will also be available at the turkey shoot prior to the draw time.

The prizes consist of either a 12 gauge Remington shotgun, a Winchester 30.30 rifle or \$75 in cash. The tickets will sell for 50¢ each or 3 for \$1.00.

- The proceeds of the turkey shoot will be used in an expansion fund, such as building a Skeet range, for this reason the club has set up a committee to investigate the possibilities of building such a range on their land. If this is not possible, the club will try and lease some land near by on which to build its Skeet range. Upon completion, it will be open to the public.
- If the weather necessitates the cancelling of the shoot on October 22nd, it will be held on the following Saturday. The shoot starts at 1 p.m., so you local duck, pheasant and rabbit hunters should keep this date open, as it's a good way to get your trigger finger loosened up, you may win yourself a nice fat Sunday dinner, and you're sure to enjoy yourself.
