Mail Delivery Perking Fine Only Minor Troubles in Year

"Nor wind, nor rain, nor sleet, shall stop the mail in its appointed rounds." However, threatening dogs come close to achieving what the elements can't, according to Postmaster Harold Marshall reviewing the one year old mail delivery service in town.

It seems dogs chasing mailmen is not a scene confined to the funny papers — Nor is the resultant financial responsibility of the owner. The postmaster says a year of mail delivery has presented very few problems, and credits the public with the smooth operation. "I was surprised how quickly the complete address was adopted," stated Mr. Marshall after years of just the "Georgetown" address. "A little more snow shoveling would help the mailman

on his appointed rounds particularly on the sidewalks leading to the houses. Mr. Marshall suggested:

"There are 8 mailmen in town, 6 letter carriers and two supervisors. Each man does two routes, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The postmaster was asked his opinion of female letter carriers. "No objection, but I think the weight would be too much for the average woman," he replied. "Women are much better suited to other areas of postal work," he concluded.

"A proposal by the Post Office Dept. to provide the letter carriers with a hand cart, not unlike a golf cart, is being considered. However, snow on rough roads will probably rule this out.

May Have Two More Polling Booths, Municipal Elections

Probably two more polling booths will be established in East Georgetown for this December's municipal elections. This, with other matters relating to the election, was discussed Monday when council took initial action towards establishing polling places and naming returning officers and poll clerks.

Last year's locations and clerks were reviewed, and suggestions made for new clerks where previous ones have moved from town. Council has also authorized a change in voting hours, with polls slated to open at 10:30 a.m. and close at 7:30 p.m. on voting day, Monday, December 5th.

The nomination meeting will be held on Thursday, November 24th.

your job is," he said. "But I still feel you have evaded the question. Is it a fact you don't want the figures published?"

Mayor Hyde said the speaker was entitled to ask questions, but that it was not in order for a delegation to debate a matter with council.

"I've given you the best answer I can," he concluded. "You will have an opportunity to express your resentment in two months or less."

Opening six tenders received in answer to an advertisement for a new police cruiser, council turned these over to the police and property committees for review.

"Only one dealer named a trade-in price for the old cruiser.

"It's difficult to consider buying a new vehicle without trading in the old one," remarked Mayor Hyde.

Sparks Fly Briefly as Property Zoning Reviewed

Ideas on zoning were introduced by three councillors following reading of a letter from the Community Planning Branch at Queen's Park at Monday's council meeting.

Referring to the controversial Wilson property on the highway, the department said that a solicitor, acting for Margaret Thompson, is asking the government to review the decision to keep the land zoned as residential. The owner desires rezoning as commercial.
