If anyone in town, especially in the new Delrex development is having trouble with their garbage cans being knocked over and their garbage thrown all over the back yard, this may be of interest to you, as I have been having said trouble for some time now and have been blaming some hungry big dog for the damage being caused.

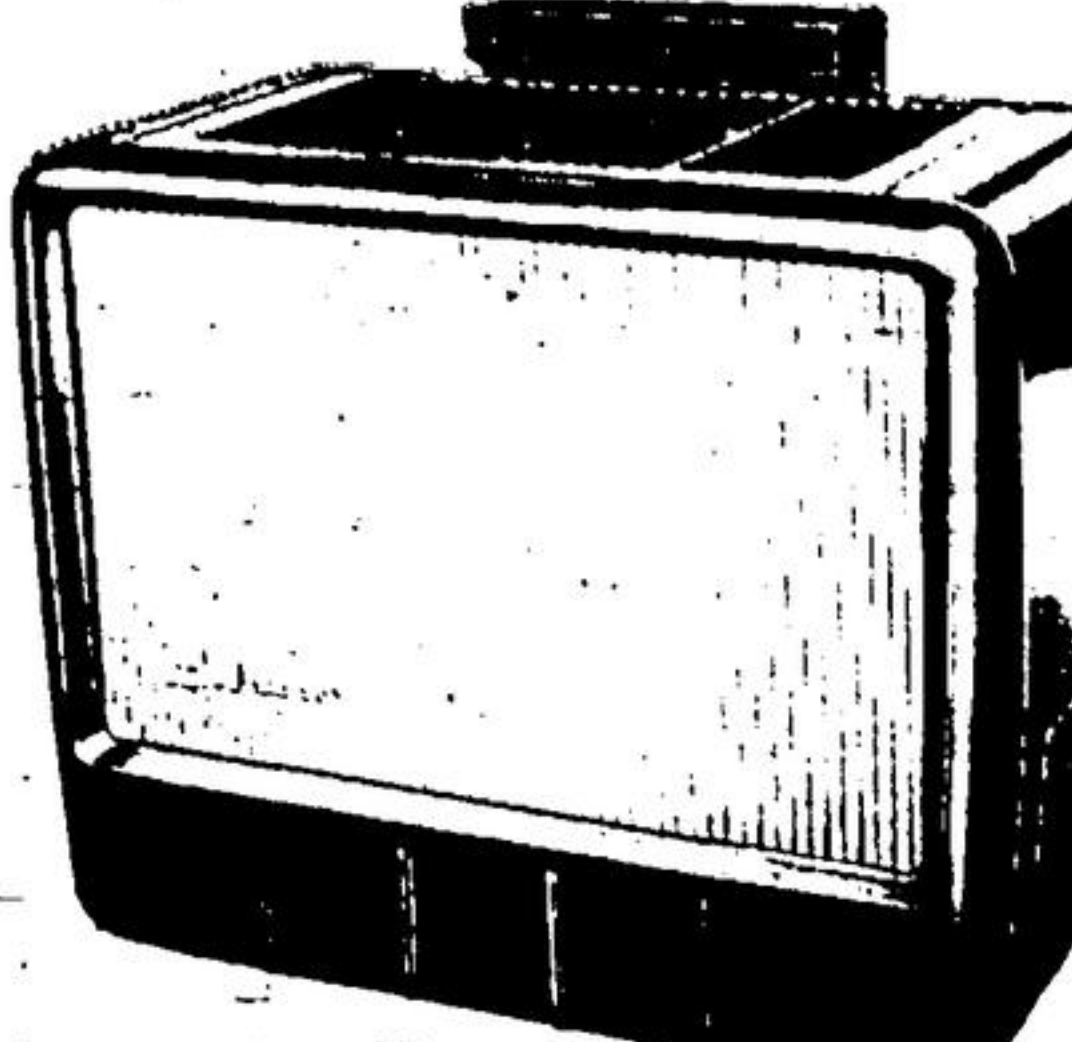
