

**Brother-in-Law Works
On India Atom Reactor**

An article appearing in a recent issue of the Illustrated Weekly of India is particularly interesting to a local family, Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Fishig, Victoria Crescent.

The article tells about the Canada-India Reactor, India's second atomic reactor which went into operation in July. It is located at Trombay, near Bombay.

The CIB is a joint Indo-Canadian enterprise under the Colombo Plan in which the costs and responsibilities have been shared by the two countries. One of the technicians who worked on the project is D. L. Tegart whose wife is Mrs. Fishig's sister. Mr. and Mrs. Tegart and their young son Lyall went to India a year ago from their former home at Deep River.

As the reactor is located near a densely populated city it is housed in a hermetically sealed steel shell. A pipeline carries 15,000 gallons of sea water per minute to the heat exchanger. The reactor itself is a 30-foot high cylindrical tank.

Completion of the plant puts into the hands of Indian scientists and engineers a research tool of the utmost value.

**Holiday Football Crowds
Are Estimated at 100,000**

More than 100,000 fans are expected to join four Eastern Football Conference stadiums next weekend as Hamilton and Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal play their traditional home-and-home Thanksgiving series. With 1960 providing the most exciting race in years, Big Four overall attendance is rushing toward a new record.

Attendance at the two tie games of 24,145 in Toronto and 19,264 in Ottawa brought total attendance at 18 league

games to 414,750, an average per game of 23,042. At this rate more than 650,000 will watch the Big Four's entire regular schedule of 28 games, a figure close to 1,000,000 more than 1959. Montreal has drawn 118,052 in five home games. Toronto has tallied 112,481 for four games. Ottawa has 97,749 for five and Hamilton 86,477 in four.

Off last weekend, Hamilton Tiger-Cats now threaten to be the dramatic upset team of the Big Four.

After the Tiger-Cats lost their first five games this year, President J. G. "Jake" Gaudaur and Coach Jim Trimble began re-

construction of the Hamilton team which had won three consecutive Big Four championships. Gaudaur and Trimble began a wide search for new players.

Replacement Players
"Adversity has made us sharper. This season has taught us that a team has to replace a few players every year if it wants to stay on top," said Gaudaur before starting on a recruiting tour of National League camps a few weeks ago.

"We are going to recruit players from the National Football League. If these players can't help us catch up and get us into the playoffs this year, then they'll form the nucleus of a strong team next season. Never again, though, will we stand pat."

The Gaudaur-Trimble reconstruction paid off in Ottawa, Oct. 1, when the Tiger-Cats defeated the Rough Riders, 27-18. It was Hamilton's second victory in nine games and left the Tiger-Cats only two points (one victory) behind the third place Montreal Alouettes.

Argos First
Toronto Argonauts advanced into sole possession of first place by walloping Alouettes, 50-15 in Toronto, in a game which saw Argo quarterback Tubin photo set a new league record of seven touchdowns passes. The old record of six touchdowns passes was set by Sam Etcheberry, of Montreal, against Toronto in 1954 and equaled by him against Hamilton in 1956.

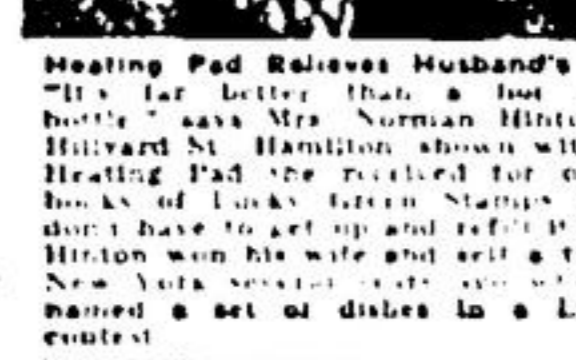
