Brother-In-Law Works
On India Atom Reactor

An article appearing in a recent issue of the Illustrated Weekly of India is particularly interesting to a local family. Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Fiebig, Victoria Crescent.

The article tells about the Canada-India Reactor, India's second atomic reactor which went into operation in July. It is located at Trombay, near Bombay.

The CIR is a joint Indo-Canadian enterprise under the Colombo Plan in which the costs and responsibilities have been shared by the two countries. One of the technicians who worked on the project is D. L. Tegart, whose wife is Mrs. Fiebig's sister. Mr. and Mrs. Tegart and their young son tally went to India a year ago from their former "home" at Deep River.

As the reactor is located near a densely populated city, it is housed in a hermetically sealed steel shell. A pipeline carries 18,000 gallons of sea water per minute to the heat exchangers. The reactor itself is a 30-foot high cylindrical tank.

Completion of the plant puts into the hands of Indian scientists and engineers a research tool of the utmost value.
