### Heavy Influx of U.S.A. Immigrants

Carl T. Rowan, a Pulitzer prize winning reporter for the Minneapolis Tribune, writes in the October Reader's Digest, the many reasons why 10,000 to 11,000 Americans are emigrating to Canada yearly. Many of those who come, he reports, are looking for a 'safer pace of living' and a 'safer pace of life.' Others are rugged individualists who itch with a pioneer spirit. Since Canada's glory is her room for expansion, there is not so much push and shove here, but so much cooperation.

Best Wheat

What kind of a Canada do these newcomers find today, asks Rowan.

Canada is the grower of the world's best wheat, which last year sold 125 million bushels more than the United States. One half of all the newspaper pages of the world are printed on Canadian paper. Canada is a top producer of uranium, nickel, asbestos and zinc. It is also the number one supplier of U.S. imports and the top purchaser of U.S. exports.

The province of Alberta alone has some 112,000 residents from the United States, many of them oilmen from Texas and Oklahoma now living in Calgary or Edmonton, centre of a great new petrochemical industry. At one Canadian college, last year 80 percent of the applicants for teaching positions were from the United States. Many professors are lured from the U.S. by the fact that some Canadian universities now pay more than comparable U.S. institutions.

Discourage Unskilled

Canada has opened immigration offices in New York, Chicago, Denver and San Francisco. These officers tell a prospect when and what the job opportunities are they counsel applicants interested in setting up a business; they will even help a farmer find a farm or arrange a loan. Above all, they discourage people without special skills or training.

Immigration Minister Ellen Fairbairn says: "Canada needs immigrants; they stimulate our economy both as producers and consumers. And we especially want more people from the United States."
