# Bob Burke, Jim Brown to Seek December Council Seats

## Delrex Ratepayers Back Men, Want Representation

First men to indicate their intention to seek council office in December are Bob Burke, 73 Sargent Road and Jim Brown, 50 Sargent Road.

Endorsed at a meeting of the Delrex Ratepayers Association on October 4th, as having the backing of the association in seeking office, the two nominees indicated that they will be candidates as councillors.

The meeting was a special one, called to choose two men from a group of candidates named by a nominating committee which had been appointed at a meeting last month.

The 10 member committee had interviewed several prospects and five men had previously agreed to stand, explained H. Powell, secretary of the nominating committee, and introduced Eric Beard, Bill Richmond, Jack Critchlow, Bob Burke and Jim Brown as interested candidates.

Direct representation for Delrex area is council is an association according to president Wm. H. Carr, who chaired the meeting.

"We're not running a state," Mr. Carr explained, "and we will be pleased if we can get two candidates elected."

Five minutes was allowed each candidate to speak to the audience.

Eric Beard introduced himself as an insurance agent with a previous record of being sworn in as an officer in the British and later the Canadian army.

His army career had given him administrative experience which he feels will be useful in local government.

"Since the last election I'm getting angrier every day at council treatment of our district," he said. "We get an off handed reception and no courtesy when we bring problems to council."

He criticized waste in public affairs. "25c of every tax dollar he estimates is not wisely spent."

"I've investigated things thoroughly and I know the answers. Nobody will hoodwink me if I'm elected," he declared.

Pointing out that Delrex pays half the tax revenue, yet has no representation, Bill Richmond termed this a "very ing shame."

"I can see a 6 mill tax rate increase due to bad administration," he stated.

Following the speeches, ballots were handed to the hundred-odd ratepayers present. Mr. Burke headed the election, and the four other candidates were closely grouped, with Mr. Brown emerging in second place. Volunteers were asked for a campaign committee to work for the two and Mr. Burke's suggestion of a grievance committee which could obtain ideas for an election platform was accepted.

Regular meetings of the association have been planned for the first Tuesday each month and they will be held in the new Delrex building which has been offered free for public use by the development firm.

Chairman Carr said the town council had agreed to keep polling booths open an extra half hour on election day (the association had asked an extra two hours) and council is also considering two extra polling booths as requested.

Some councillors also seemed to favour handing out of committee reports at nomination meeting, he said, though council has taken no definite action on this.

Recreational convenor Bob McNeilly passed out questionnaires asking meeting attendees to state their ideas about activities which the association might sponsor and asked for volunteers to serve on his committee.

Door prize, a string of Christmas lights, was won by Mrs. J. Durno.

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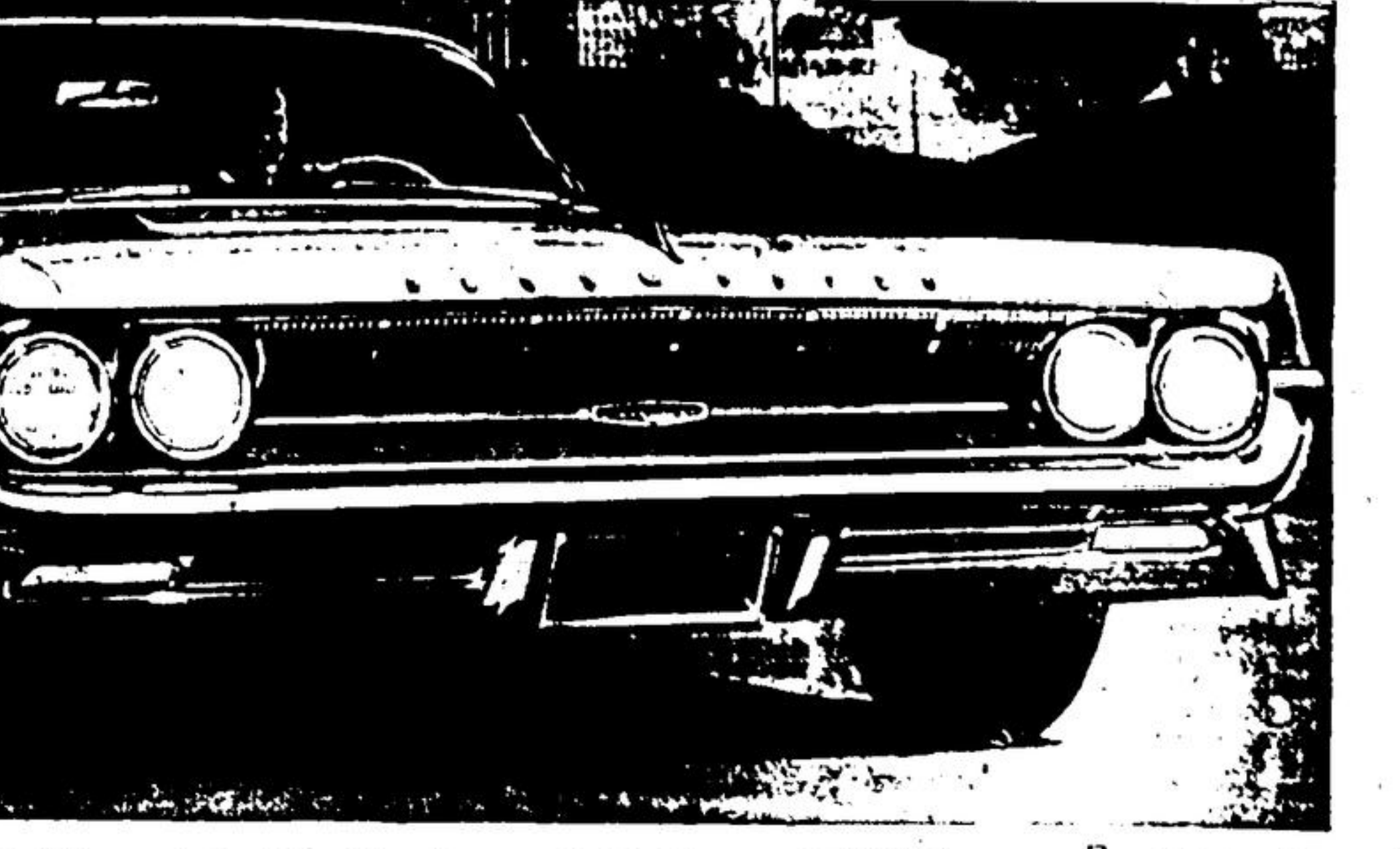
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
