Canada's Armed Forces

SOEST, West Germany — This week we want to tell you about a Canadian Army man and his wife and family and how they live in this area of Western Germany so many miles from home and in a strange country, with strange people and language.

Through the good offices of the acting commanding officer, Major William Mulhern, First Battalion, Canadian Guards, we met Corporal J. G. Hamilton of Ottawa, and we visited his wife, Maureen and their four children in the spick and span apartment at the Permanent Married Quarters (the PMQ Community, as it is known).

The Hamiltons have a three bedroom apartment in the six apartment flat, with kitchen, bathroom, diningroom and livingroom. A balcony from the second storey apartment looks over the play area about which this group of apartments is built.

The Army provides all the essentials, including electric range and refrigerator, and the only things the families have to bring over are sheets and pillowcases, knickknacks and radio. This rent, paid through the special allowance, equals about \$33 a month, including heat and services. Mrs. Hamilton said she is happy with the accommodation, she finds the furniture serviceable and sturdy, and, even though a transformer has to be used for Canadian electrical appliances, the Army are all built for German voltage.

The Hamiltons are a typical family, we discovered, living in the PMQs. They have four children, Stephen, 6; Kathleen (a real ball of fire) 3; Peter, 2 and John, four months.

Stephen attends the elementary school at the 'overflow' school at Fort Chambly, going on the school bus. They attend church at Fort York, where Roman Catholic and Protestant Chapels look after the spiritual needs of the soldiers and their families. Each of the 'forts' has its chapels.

Mrs. Hamilton shops at the

store just around the corner in the PMQ area, where she can buy Canadian type foods at prices comparable to those back home.

"For six marks (about \$1.40) we can fill the trunk of our car with vegetables at the Soest market," Mrs. Hamilton said. "Do they have enough entertainment and social life? The big problem, said the Hamiltons, is to find enough nights in the week Mrs. Hamilton is a Bingo fan, and attends the Bingo run by the Community Council and the Red Patch club. They go to movies at the forts, there is entertainment in the Army messes and a dance once a month. Also, they can attend the British Army shows at Leppstadt and Iserlohn. Periodically throughout the summer, regimental bands give concerts in the three community areas.

Like the hundreds of other Canadian families in the Brigade area, the Hamiltons are enjoying their experience. They haven't been able to travel as much as other families, as they have four small children, but they have been to Holland since coming over last Fall, and they have plans to use future leave periods in seeing more of Europe from their Volkswagen.

"They'll be happy, no doubt, to return home at the end of three years to see their families and friends, but in the meantime they're making the most of their opportunity.

Next week we'll tell you about a family unable to obtain quarters in the PMQ, and who are living in accommodation rented from a German family.

Ex-Mayor of Georgetown On Overseas Farm Tour

Several District Folks On Jaunt To Britain

A number of local people are among a group of Canadian farmers now enroute for the UK. The Canadian farmer's tour, 32 strong, sailed from Montreal Tuesday, Oct. 4th, aboard the 25,500 ton Canadian Pacific flag ship Empress of Britain for Greenock, Scotland. The vessel, under the command of Capt. J. P. Dobson, DSC, is expected to call at the South East coast of England, arriving there the following day, Tuesday, October 11th.

Organized by Canadian Pacific's Immigration and Agricultural Development Department, the farmers tour will give Canadian agriculturalists a chance during the month long sojourn to study agricultural methods in England and Scotland. Their 1,100 mile trip through Scotland and England by motor coach call for stops from York, London to London. The farm tour will include visits to farms where notable strides have been made in agricultural and animal husbandry in the past twenty years, calls at agricultural colleges to research in studies and demonstration farms to discuss new developments, agricultural shows including the famous Scottish Showtown breeders' sale in Perth as well as the mechanized farming centre at Boreham.

Nothing will be left out in including visits to such famous and ancient tourist attractions as Burns Cottage and Canterbury Cathedral. The party of 38 Canadian farmers will be received by the Rt. Hon. George Drew, High Commissioner for Canada in London, October 24th. Sailing on the trip from Ontario are Mr. A. H. Creighton, special representative.
