## Halton 4-H Clubs Outstanding Year

In Halton County 4-H Club Girls and Boys completed 170 4-H Club projects in 1960. The 4-H Club programme in Ontario is directed by the Extension Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the Canada Department of Agriculture and local sponsoring organizations.

J. A. Francis, Agricultural Representative, and D. E. Jackson, Assistant Agricultural Representative, direct the 4-H programme in Halton County.

The Halton 4-H Club Leaders Council, with chairman A. R. Coulter, and vice-chairman John Willmott, are a group of over thirty 4-H Club Leaders who provide voluntary assistance throughout the year to the 4-H Club members in the County.

Before a 4-H Club can be organized, there must be a local sponsoring organization. In Halton there is excellent support given in all areas of the county. The Acton, George-

town, and Halton Agricultural Societies, as well as the History Club of Milton, and the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority, provide financial assistance and facilities for the 4-H Club Members in their area.

There were eleven 4-H Clubs organized in Halton with ninety-eight 4-H animals exhibited at fairs, and 45 field crop exhibits, as well as 10 Forestry Club exhibits and 4 Tractor Club exhibits. Eight of the eleven 4-H Clubs built Club exhibits, to demonstrate some part of their 4-H project at local fairs.

In the Calf Club projects there were 41 Holstein, 11 Jersey, 12 Guernsey, 3 Beef heifers, and 10 steers.

In the Swine Club eight completed the project, with 7 York shire girls and one Landrace.

There were two new 4-H Clubs formed this year in Halton, and both of these 4-H Clubs were very successful.

The Acton - Nassagaweya 4-H Club had 13 members

complete their project. This is the first year these members have been in a 4-H Club, and it is expected that interest shown by the members will increase this club in 1961.

The Halton 4-H Sheep Club which was started to promote the growing of better bred age corn, had 15 members complete the project. Excellent samples of age corn were exhibited by all members at the Georgetown Fair.

Two 4-H Club Members have been selected from each of the 4-H Clubs in Halton to represent their County in the 1961 Provincial 4-H Inter-Club Competitions being held at the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph on October 21st. This competition sponsored by the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Ontario Department of Education, gives 4-H Club Members from across the Province a chance to compete against each other. The two members chosen from each 4-H Club compete separately in the competition, and their scores are added together for the final standing. Competitions are held for members of 4-H Dairy Cattle, Beef Cattle, Swine, Poultry, Grain, Field Crops, Potatoes, Livestock and Tractor Clubs.

The final program for 4-H

Club Members in Halton is to be held on Friday, December 16th at the Milton High School. At this time all 4-H Club members will be presented to the 4-H Members who have done such an excellent job this year.

## Receive Far East Entries For Royal Winter Fair

### 4-H Club Week Will Bring Fair Visitors

Many of the nation's top agriculturalists, including the Hon. Douglas S. Harkness, Minister of Agriculture for Canada, and the Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, are among members of the Board of Directors for the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and, with the management and staff, are now finalizing plans for the Royal's colourful opening here on November 11.

**Champion of Shows**  
Billed as the "champion of shows" and the show of champions, this year's Royal promises to be among the best in the history of this big annual exhibition which dates back to 1922. Each of Canada's 1961 highlights is expected to be represented in the thousands of entries which will be on display as exhibitors compete for the Royal's coveted trophies, ribbons and cash awards totaling nearly \$160,000.

**Thrilling**  
Indications are that the Royal Show will again be a thrilling and colourful spectacle with some of the world's greatest riders and finest horses. Teams from the United States, Ireland, Venezuela and Mexico will compete against Canada for honours in the International Jumping competitions. Another highlight of the Royal Show will be personal appearances by Duncan Renaldo of Hollywood, more commonly known as the "Cisco Kid".

**100 Judges**  
More than 100 judges from three different nations will be in attendance to select prize-winning entries from the 1,200 horses, 2,500 cattle, 1,000 swine, 1,200 sheep and goats, 4,000 poultry and pet stock. They will also judge large displays of grain, vegetables, dairy and poultry products, fruit and flowers, tobacco, tropical fish and maple products.

**4-H Week**  
While the 1960 Royal is in progress from November 11 to 19, the 20th annual 4-H Club week, sponsored by the Canadian Council of 4-H Clubs, will be held in Toronto. As a result, many 4-H Club members from different parts of Canada will have an opportunity to visit the Royal.

**Biggest Fair**  
Entries for this year's biggest fall fair of them all have been received from as far as

Australia, England and New Zealand. Several entries of grain have already been shipped to Toronto for display from the countries from "down-under", while an entry of apples has been received from the United Kingdom.

**Children's Royal**  
Interesting features of the 1960 Royal, an outstanding flower show, a horse shoe pitching competition, a fashion show, rare tropical fish and a novel display of six Shetland Ponies drawing a miniature antique steam fire engine.
