

Six Teams Comprise New Group In OHA Intermediate "A" Hockey

First Game For Raiders In Milton On Nov. 15th

The OHA Intermediate A Central Ontario league will be a six team setup this year.

The six entries, including new comers, Dundas and Barrie, were accepted last Thursday night when club representatives met with the league executive. OHA official Tim O'Neil, in the Hunter Real Estate office here.

Comprising the "B" circuit are four A clubs, Georgetown, Barrie, Milton and Dundas, and the two remaining Intermediate "B's," Port Credit and Bradford.
