## Weed Control News

### Clean Lawns Beautify

Nearly everyone has an ambition to have plenty of natural beauty surrounding the home. Of all the shrubs and landscape around the modern house, the lawn is perhaps the most important. Without a lawn the most expensive dwelling might well be cold barren and unattractive. In order that the homeowner can enjoy such beauty, considerable hard work, expense and planning go into every square foot of a good lawn. Establishing a healthy turf is only part of the battle as constant attention and work is necessary to maintain it. This fact has probably become very apparent to many residents, who upon returning from vacation have found the grass patchy and the weeds with the old weed sprayers are abundant about one foot in height.

Weed control in lawns is a somewhat one of the major maintenance problems. According to the Ontario Department of Agriculture, an average of 100 different weeds are reported to infest the lawn of each year. The excellent herbicides have been prepared by the Department of Agriculture and are available to the public and may be secured from the local office or by mail. A request to the Ontario Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 100, Toronto. The most effective weed control is a weed infestation in lawns is of course to prevent it in the first place. This is done by a healthy lawn which has a chance to grow. The use of recommended fertilizers and the maintenance of high soil fertility together with proper watering and clipping are the best ways to achieve a healthy lawn.

However, the best means of weed control is by the use of herbicides. For the benefit of residents who do not have the time to do this, I am listing the best herbicides:

## Control of Lawn Weeds from Bulletin 329

By way of warning, however, I must emphasize that all chemicals used in lawns must be used as directed by the manufacturer. Careless mixing, spraying when the wind is blowing or holding the nozzle too high from the ground may result in damage to desirable shrubs or plants. Satisfactory results however, may be expected if you follow instructions.

Table 1 — Control of Lawn Weeds

1. **Black Medick** — 1 lb. per 24 D in 2 gals water. Spray when plants are young.

2. **Chickweed** (Mosses) — Potassium cyanate 12 oz. plus 24 D in 2 gal. water. Water 1 oz. in 5 gal. water also effective.

3. **Chickweed** (Common) — Same as for Mosses or 24 D applied when weeds are young.

4. **Goatweed** — Potassium cyanate 12 oz. in 2 gal. water. Apply 2 oz. per 1000 sq. ft.

5. **Yellow** — Potassium cyanate 12 oz. plus 24 D in 2 gal. water.

6. **Bell Flower** — Potassium cyanate 12 oz. plus several applications of 24 D in 2 gal. water.
