Recommend Hudson as Best Winter Barley

Winter barley can be grown successfully in Ontario only in the southern part of the province, says Roland Lounsbury, Genetics and Plant Breeding Institute, Ottawa.

Hudson is the only recommended variety.

Where adapted, winter barley yields better and matures earlier than spring barley.

Improved strains that are expected to extend the cultural range of winter barley are being tested by plant breeders of the Ontario Agricultural College and of the Research Branch, Canada Department of Agriculture.


