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# Urges Cautious Approach To Socialized Medicine

A "think before you leap" approach to socialized medicine was advocated Wednesday afternoon, by the president-elect of the Ontario Medical Association.

Speaking at the annual meeting of OMA District No. 5, Dr. R. H. McCreary of Arnprior cautioned the medical profession and the public to plan wisely when instituting medical programmes to look after the aged, those suffering from catastrophic illness and the medically indigent.

**Avoid Dangers**  
"In our eagerness to provide medical care for these groups, we must avoid the dangers of standardization of medical services, of mass medicine, of deterioration of patient-physician relationship, and the loss of initiative of the part of both."

Dr. McCreary was named president-elect of the Ontario Medical Association following an election by delegates from all sections of the province last May. He takes the office of President at the 81st annual OMA convention in May, 1961. In the intervening period he is visiting all eleven geographic districts of the Association on the occasion of their annual district meeting.

Dr. McCreary told doctors in District No. 5 area at the Skyline Hotel that they must continuously be on guard against the danger of compromising their principles while protecting their primary objective of caring for people and promoting the public health.

In discussing work being carried out by committees within the OMA, Dr. McCreary made special note of two studies now in progress. He said one Committee is determining ways and means of improving present doctor-sponsored prepaid medical insurance plans. He said another group of doctors is reviewing all prepaid medical plans as they exist or could be developed, to produce the most satisfactory arrangement for the subscriber and the medical profession.

**Privileged Class**  
"Circumstances have made us a privileged class and privileges carries with it responsibilities. We must be ready to accept responsibilities. We must be ready to make sacrifices for welfare of others in the profession and for the welfare of the public in general."

"It is not enough for us to support our ethics, principles and policies. We have a duty to make these known to our patients, to the public, to lay organizations and to government. We must be willing to discuss them with anyone. Having done so, we should be willing to collaborate in anything that is done or cooperate in any plan which is based on these principles. Surely the profession, the public, lay organizations, and government have sufficient ingenuity to resolve and to provide satisfactory solutions for any and all problems in the medical care field."

**Statement of Policy**  
"Our statement of policy affirms:

1. That the Medical profession is willing to accept responsibility for the provision of a high standard of medical care for all, regardless of race, creed, or economic status.

2. That the people as a whole and as individuals should accept economic responsibility for medical services, and

3. That the Ontario Medical Association continues to be in favour of the application of insurance principles to assist the public to meet this economic responsibility.

# Recommend Hudson as Best Winter Barley

Winter barleys can be grown successfully in Ontario only in the southern part of the province, says Roland Louie, cereals and plant breeding specialist, Ottawa.

Hudson is the only recommended variety. Where adapted, winter barley yields better and matures earlier than spring barleys. Improved strains that are expected to extend the cultural range of winter barleys are being tested by plant breeders of the Ontario Agricultural College and of the Research Branch, Canada Department of Agriculture.

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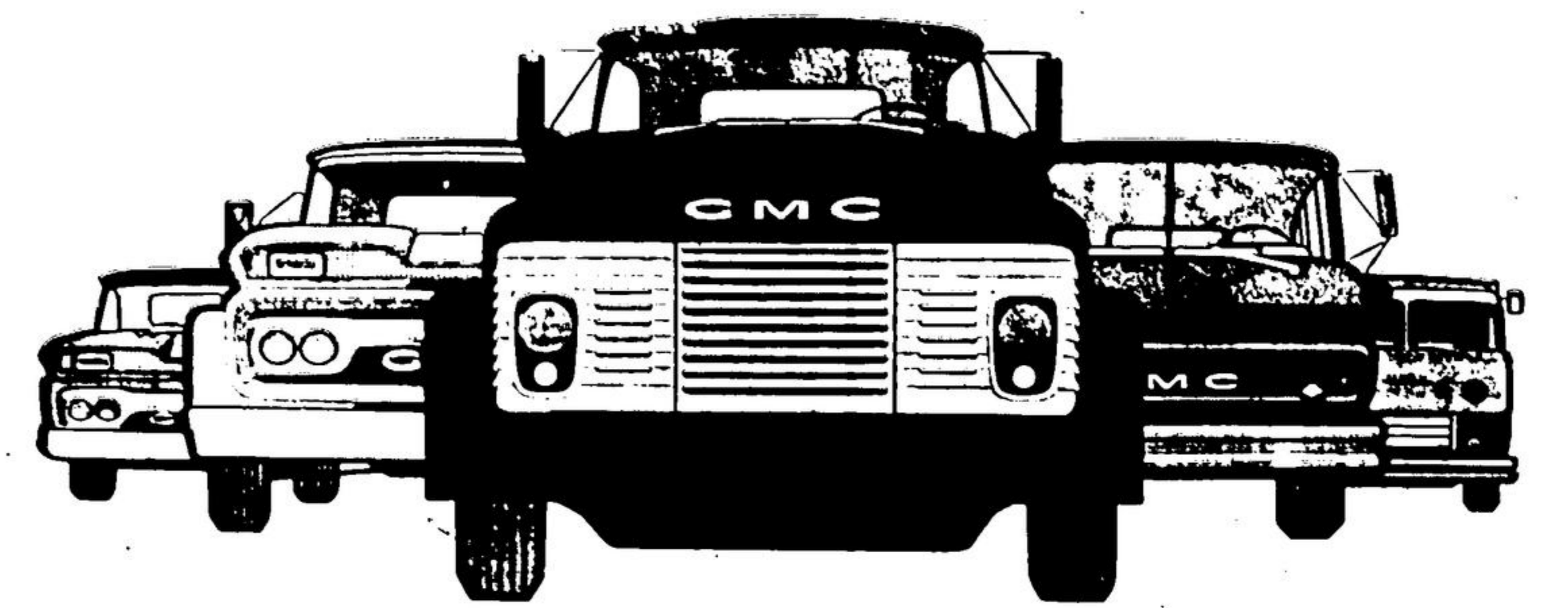
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
