Original Pump Organ Used, Knox Centennial

Four Services Mark 100 Years for Church

An historic touch to the centennial anniversary services of Knox Presbyterian Church was the use of the original pump organ which was used in the church from 1873 until an electric organ was installed.

The organ, unused for many years, was put in shape for the occasion and played by Mrs. Edgar Crowland for the opening prayer selection at each of the four services.

The services, on the past two Sundays, drew capacity congregations, with many former church members returning to share in the happy occasion.

Rev. Alex Calder conducted all services. On October 16th, Professor Donald Wade of Knox College staff, gave inspiration with two excellent sermons and in the evening showed movies and slides of Asia where he had spent a recent year. Dr. Ross Cameron, son of a former pastor, preached on the last Sunday to overflow congregations. His wife and son Donald accompanied him to town for the day.

Another visitor that evening was Rev. John McDermid of Brampton, another Georgetown "old boy" who brought greetings from other district ministers as well as his personal ones.

An anniversary cake was cut at an evening reception by Alex Hume, former cleric of session. Following each of the services, there was a luncheon, with the Ladies' Auxiliary arranging these for the mornings and the Women's Association for the evenings.

Solve Drainage Problems For New Church Building

Town Foots Bill Church to Repay

Drainage problems on the new Maple Ave. Baptist Church property have been solved to the mutual satisfaction of the church and town council.

Recently the town sold the land for \$3,000 with the understanding that the church would attend to drainage from a natural water course which traverses it. Last week the land was stripped, and the town engineer, worried that spring would bring a drainage problem on Maple Ave., declined to issue a building permit.

Appearing for the church at Monday's council meeting, solicitor Terry Baines and Rev. Bruce Woods outlined the problem from the church side. While there is no dispute about the church's responsibility, they explained that financing is difficult and they had hoped to install only a portion of the drain at present.

Council explained that unless the whole drain is in, silt will collect, and cannot be removed once it gets in the drain under Maple Ave.

After consultation, council agreed to purchase \$1500 in materials and have the church repay the town, with interest, over a three-year period. An agreement is being drawn up, and the church has promised to complete the work as soon as possible.

Looking ahead to next year's rodeo, two Lions Club members, Bob Brick and Will Brisban suggested adding to park facilities by creating a rodeo ring and seating accommodation at the extreme west end of the park.

The meet, which brought together all six local elementary schools, was not graced with the tight points race involving all the competing schools which often marks a successful field day, but the competitive rivalry because of second importance as the real purpose of the meet sportsmanship — took over.

Pupils not taking part in the events going on in the track infield jammed grandstand and lined the fence and voluntarily forsook the traditional school ranking in their own school and accompanying calls for everybody else, for a surprisingly fair brand of cheering which applauded any outstanding effort no matter what colour the competitor was sporting.

The vice principals who comprised the organizing committee were especially pleased by the pupil. They were instructed beforehand to take it easy on the opposition, but the sudden wave of vocal plaudits for any exceptional achievement was spontaneous.

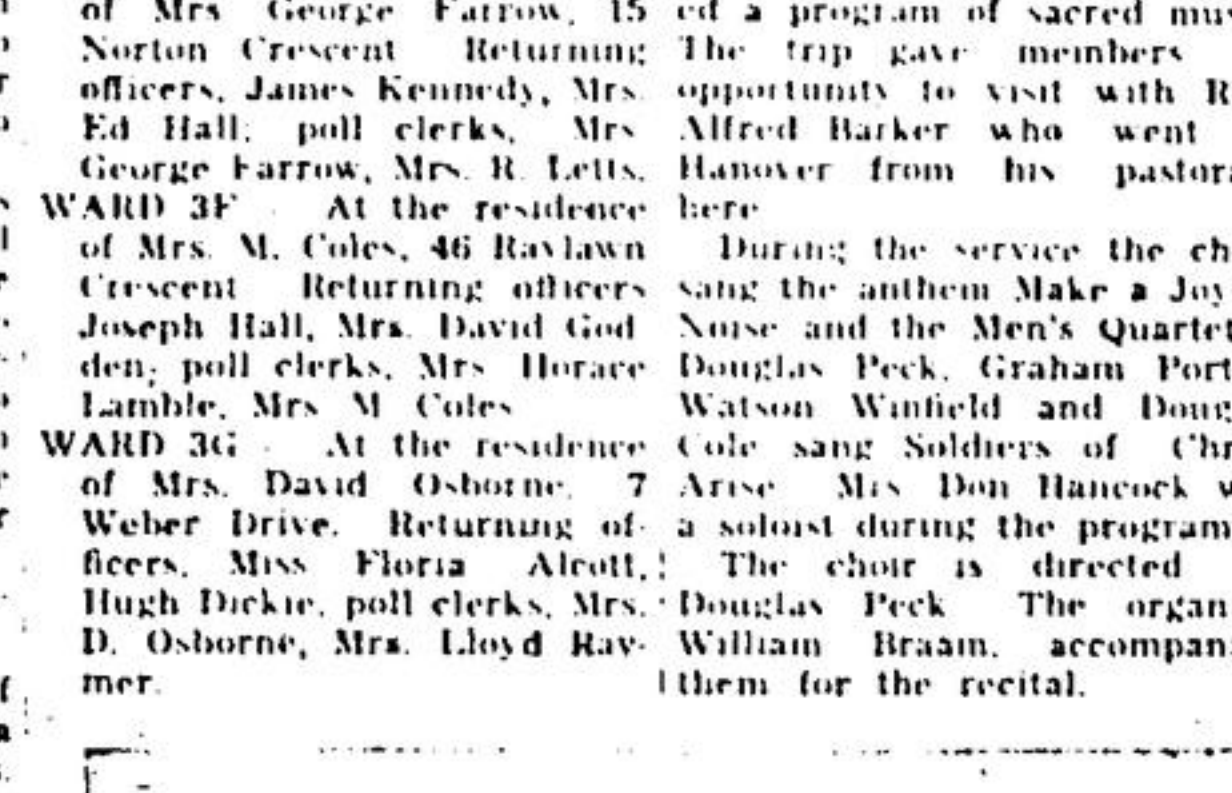
