## SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

Mistaken for duck Toronto hunter killed. This was a headline from one of Toronto's daily newspapers which appeared last week.

The story described how a hunter was mistaken for a duck and killed with one pellet fired from a shotgun at a distance of approximately 100 feet. The time of the described accident was in the dim light of sundown last Saturday.

The dictionary describes the word accident, as an unexpected, or unforeseen event, a mishap, something done unintentionally. These definitions are quite true, but a man carrying a gun is the same as a man driving a car, plane, boat, etc. And when such a person is involved in an accident, they can be charged with, among other things, criminal negligence, and dealt with according to the law.

The accident described early in this column may have been just an unexpected or unforeseen event which caused another man to lose his life.

But if the common laws of the outdoors and the laws of our province had been followed, this accident would have had odds of a million to one that it would have happened.

Below are the ten commandments of safety, or sometimes called the common laws of the outdoors for hunting game:

1. Treat every gun with the respect of a loaded gun.
2. Guns carried into camps or homes or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded.
3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
4. Always carry your gun so you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble.

5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.
6. Never point the gun at anything you don't intend to shoot.
7. Unattended guns should be left unloaded.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun.
9. Never shoot a gun at a flat, hard surface of water.
10. Never consume alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

Now to some, a few of these laws might not seem necessary, but just remember if everyone doesn't obey these or their own common sense, YOU may not be around to hunt again.

Now for the bright side of the hunting game, don't forget it's this Saturday at McLister's farm at 1 p.m. for the Georgetown annual Turkey Shoot.
