

Suggest County Levy for New Administration Centre

Order Preliminary Architect Plans

Mr. Gordon Gallagher, the newly appointed deputy reeve of Burlington, was welcomed to county council by Warden Doug Sargent. Mr. Gallagher was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of Mr. Wm. Bennett, last month.

The Georgetown Hospital Board have filed their first application for grants from the Provincial and Federal governments. Warden Doug Sargent informed county council when this application was approved they will request the first quarterly grant from the county.

The Law Association presented a brief showing the inadequacies of the present building. They pointed out the congestion that is occurring at the present time with the Supreme Court in Sessions forcing County Court into the Judge's Chambers. They also pointed out that an architect had been engaged to survey the present building with a view to remodeling and adding a new section. However, the architect felt any attempt to remodel would be a waste of money.

The brief suggested space for Court Rooms, Judges' Chambers, lawyers' rooms, offices for the Sheriff and the Surrogate Court as a necessity. Mr. Depew also told county council permanent judge would be appointed in the near future.

Reeve Hockman of Burlington asked if the county administration moves will be made there is enough room for the Justice Department.

Mr. Depew replied that examination was conducted with that in mind and the answer is "No."

Warden Doug Sargent thanked the delegation for their presentation of the brief and promised every consideration for the building committee's recommendation that one building to house both the county administration and the administration of justice should be erected on the recently purchased land, was endorsed by the Council. They also authorized the committee to have the architect Mr. Armstrong, prepare preliminary plans for such a building.

With the interest in a possible Halton Museum growing rapidly county council decided to subscribe to the Ontario Historical Society. Deputy Reeve H. Merry of Oakville will attend the convention in Hamilton.

be offered at all of the Teachers' Colleges in 1967-68 and 1968-69 with the exception of the University of Ottawa Teachers' College.
