

# Graduate Students Preparing Official Plan of Georgetown

## Interesting Visitors Here From Many Lands

Graduate students, in conjunction with a course they are taking at the University of Toronto, will be much in evidence in Georgetown for the next month or so.

Some twenty men and women will be engaged in the preparation of an official plan of the town which will embody a wealth of information. They started to work on Monday, following a welcome extended by Mayor Hyde and Reeve Sargent who, with other councillors and municipal officials met with the group in the council chamber.

### Study History

One group will study Georgetown's history and economic development. Included in this is an analysis of type of employment and place of employment in relation to residence.

Another will use land use as their theme, mapping existing land and building uses, density and topography.

Schools, recreation and housing are the responsibility of these students, and one student will study the town's centre and suggest a plan for further development.

### Contributing

Mayor Hyde welcomed the visitors warmly on Monday. "You will be contributing something to Georgetown for which we thank you," he said. "I hope you will have taken with you the charm of a Canadian community as our contribution."

## City Scholar Was Peel County Man

Dr. William A. Kirkwood, 67, the clerk of convocation at Trinity College of the University of Toronto, died Saturday at his St. Andrew's Gardens home.

Dr. Kirkwood was born in Rockside in Peel County. He attended public and high school in Brampton and the University of Toronto, where he received a Master of Arts degree in classics. After studying at Chicago and Harvard Universities he won his doctorate.

He taught high school at Walkerton in 1906. In 1907 he went to Ridley College at St. Catharines where he was a classics lecturer. He joined the staff of Trinity College in 1909. From 1912 to 1939 he taught as professor of Latin and served as registrar of the college from 1941 to 1943.

Dr. Kirkwood had been clerk of convocation since 1939.

He was a member of the Harvard and Canadian Clubs of Toronto.

He leaves his wife, the former Missie May Waddington; two sons, David of Bonn, Germany, and John of Toronto, one daughter, Mrs. T. E. Kuhn of Berkeley, Cal., and two sisters, Margaret and Elizabeth Kirkwood, both of Brampton.

## Caledon Girl Dies When Struck by Car

Clare Bouskill, 11, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bouskill of R.R. 1, Caledon, was killed last Thursday when struck by a car as she ran across No. 10 Highway near her home to get the family mail.

Police said the girl ran from behind a line of southbound traffic into the path of a northbound car driven by Leonard Sydney Cobb of River Drive Park. The girl was thrown some distance by the impact and was dead on arrival at Dufferin Area Hospital, Orangeville.

She is survived by her parents and sisters Caroline and Victoria, and brothers Vernon and David. The funeral service was on Saturday at the Harold C. 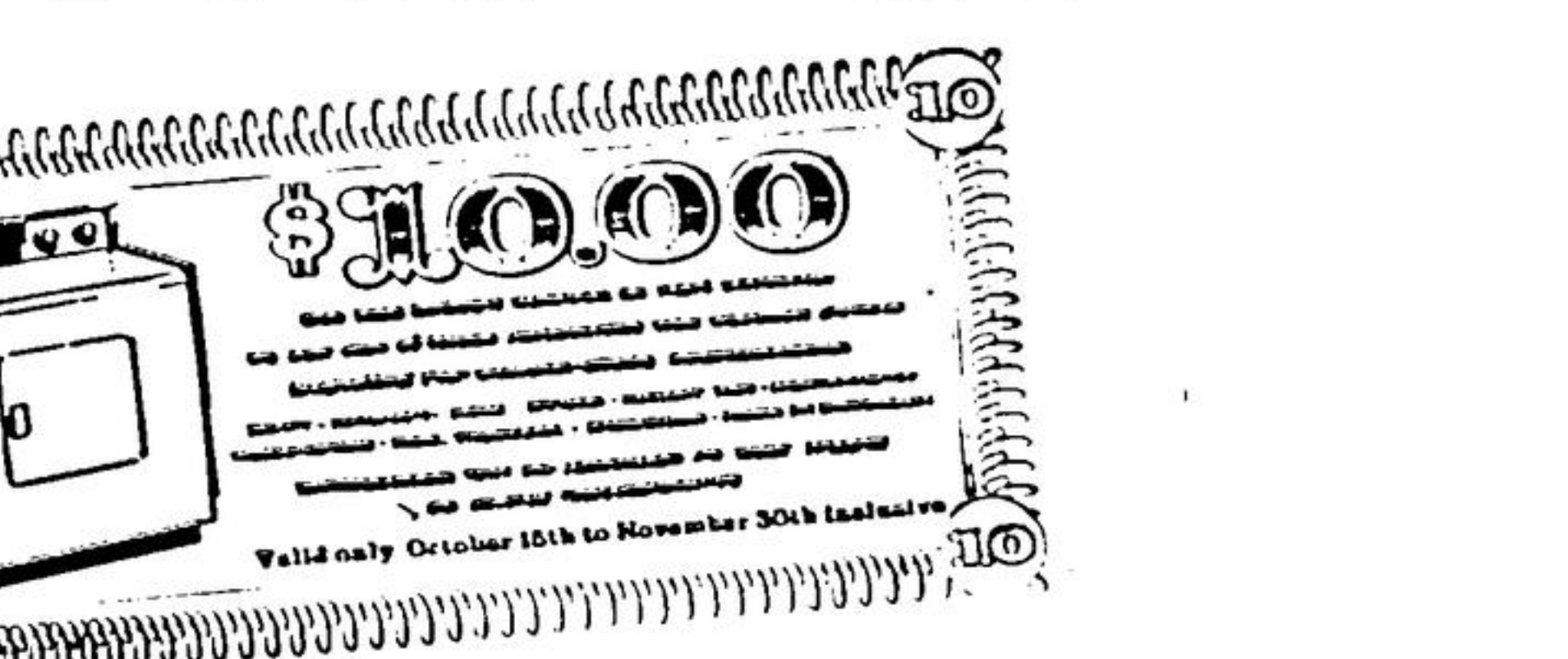
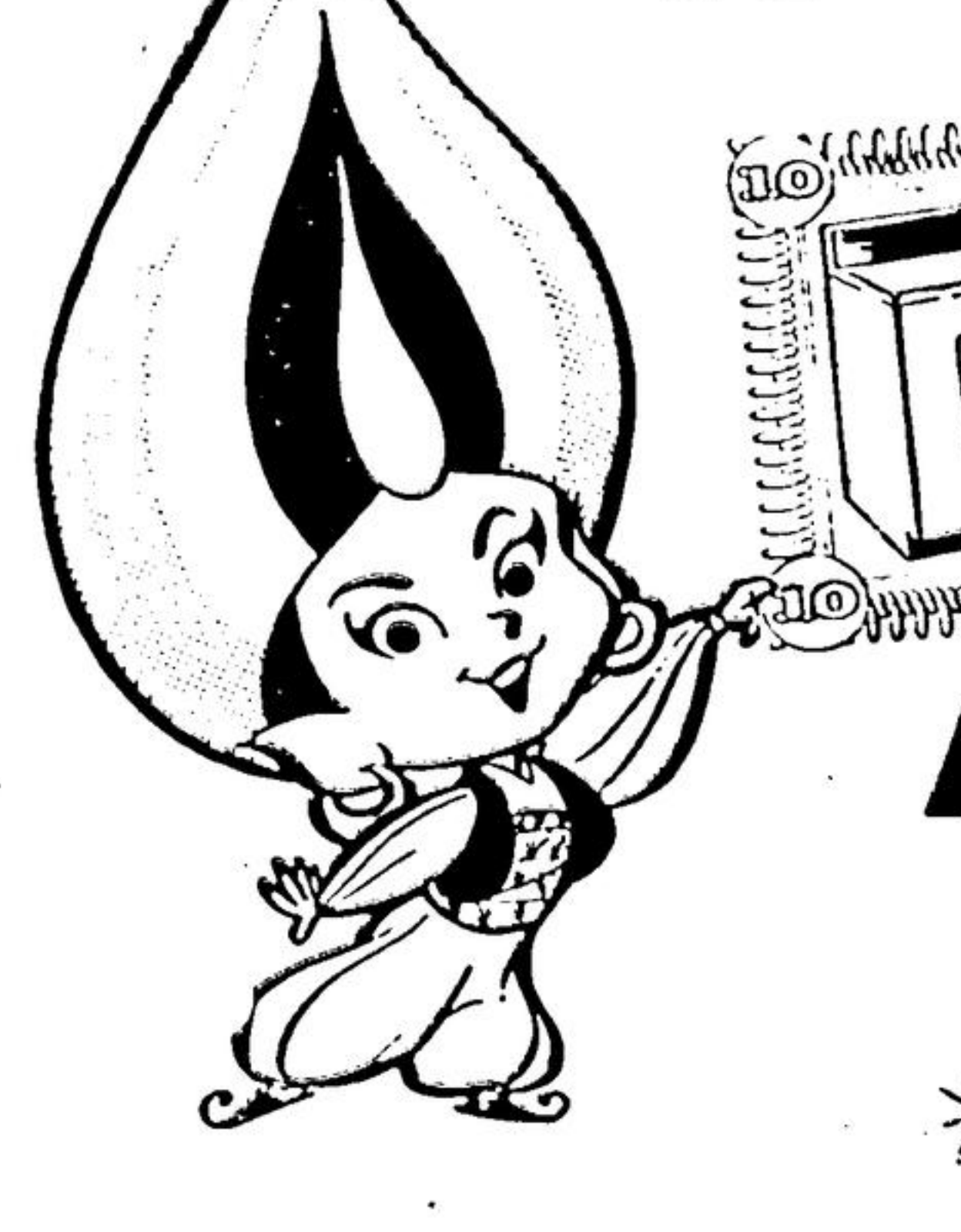
