MILTON THE TEAM TO BEAT

Swamps GHS 33-0 in First Season Clash

The Milton High Football team likes the running game and the GHS defense. In their first clash of the season last Wednesday with Georgetown, a fleetfooted Milton backfield exploded the right side of the GHS defense to crush the red and blue team, 33-0.

End sweeps and the outside running game rolled up most of Milton's 280 total yardage, 210 around the weak right side. On their infrequent thrusts to the left Milton found the same running room outside the left corner backer as they did to the right. Both corner backers were reluctant to spread apparently antcipating the off tackle plays and plunges up the middle which seldom developed. Their concern for the centre of the defensive wall was unwarranted. Led by middle guard, Gary Teeter, who played a whole of a ball game, the middle was invulnerable and it was probably this fact that prompted Milton to test the flanks — and they stayed with their obvious success. The passing game was limited to two completions, one by each team. Georgetown High picked up 157 yards, most of it in mid-field, and never penetrated beyond the Milton 25 yard line. They gave up the ball twice on fumbles. Georgetown was crippled by the absence of three first stringers and three regulars who had been unable to practice last week were used sparingly, but
