Also present were Bob Erndt, who chaired a similar tournament in Brampton last year and Ken Long who holds the post this year. The visitors brought samples of publicity material used for their successful affair and answered questions which gave a great deal of help to the local committee.

The tournament is planned for Easter week.

Billeting of visiting teams is one of the major problems, and the Ladies Auxiliary offered to look after this important end of the business. Another phase taken care of is scheduling, and the Support Group offered to take on this.

Last night another meeting was held and it was hoped to complete the organization by arranging such details as meals, mailing, entries, etc.

Publicity duties for the tournament are being handled by Harold Marshall and Walter Erndt. Arrangements for use of the arena for the week are hoped to be finalized this week after the committee confers with the Board of Parks Management which has already given its sanction to the event.

At the meeting, Mr. Asseltine stressed that there is a great deal of detail work to be done and that any interested citizens who might wish to offer their services will be welcomed if they contact any committee member.

October 15th ended a very frustrating four or five weekends for my friend George Hoare and myself, as we have been trying very sincerely to land our first Maskinonge. Noted as one of Ontario's gamest, most elusive and elusive of a dozen other words needed to describe this demon of fresh water fish, he is also the most dangerous fresh water fish once it's hooked. Saltwater comes from the fact that these fish have been known to take a full grown duck in one leap and a couple of fishing friends of mine have lost fingers to these demons one after it was boated.

A story in one of Toronto's daily papers, told about one that was found to have swallowed a full bottle of ale, which shows it doesn't have to be able to be tasty to a Maskinonge.

Frustration comes when you go fishing for Muskies and you try every known lure that might tempt them to strike, but you will come home empty handed. A friend of mine, Fred Spiros, tells me a friend of his, Jim Roe, while fishing at Dalrymple (Mud) Lake with his wife, had been fishing for a while when his wife asked him to put on another lure, Jim looked in his box and came out with a Hawaiian Wiggler and then proceeded to attach a plastic worm on the hook for good luck. Now what did Jim's wife catch on a half like that? - a very nice catch at any time, namely a five pound pickeral. While this was going on, Jim decided to take a whiff with the No. 2 Maple Spinner, and what did Jim catch with one of my favourite trout lures? Not much, just a 38 inch, 15 pound (pause while I wipe the tears from my eyes) Maskinonge. Fred tells me that Jim has tried for some three years to land a Muskie from Dalrymple Lake, but he's had no luck... now I guess Jim thinks it was all worth while.

Here's one for the road, on display at Community Furniture on No. 7 Hwy., just east of Brampton, is a very rare Fur Bearing Trout... yes, I said trout. Caught while trolling in Lake Superior off Gros Cap near Sault Ste. Marie, District of Algoma. It is believed that the depth and extreme penetrating coldness of the water in which these fish live, has caused them to grow their dense coat of unusually white fur.

A petition by the Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Association on an open deer season was put to the County Council.
