Grandson of a former Georgetown postmaster, Howard Goodenow Jermyan of 2844 Bloor St. W., Toronto, succumbed to a heart attack on October 21st. He was at work at Consumers Gas Co. where he was paymaster when he suffered the fatal attack. His grandfather, W. Goodenow, was once postmaster in town.

Born at Caledonia in 1865, Mr. Jermyan was a youngster when his parents moved to Georgetown. He attended public and high school here, then joined the Bank of Hamilton and when the first war broke out he joined the 164th Battalion. He later transferred to the Colours Artillery and went overseas with that unit.

He joined Consumers Gas in 1918.

A Baptist Mr. Jermyan was a gifted singer and had been a soloist at Farmer Memorial Baptist Church and Erskine United Church in the city.

He leaves his wife, Florence Harvey and two sisters, Kath Ivin, Mr. H. Slater of Toronto and Ruth, Mrs. C. Moffatt of Arizona.

Funeral service took place on Monday at the Turner and Porter Funeral Chapel, and interment was made later that day in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
