## Was First War Batman Lt-Col Gordon Brown

Although James Robertson had no known relatives, they were many friends and long guests of flowers at the Rumley Showmaker funeral home for his funeral in Acton last week. A retired watchman Mr. Robertson was employed by Bartley Laboratories and after they moved to Allinton, he remained in the vacant factory as watchman. He stayed when the Free Press moved in. In poor health, he went to Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto, this fall and died there.

He was born in Albany, New York, Scotland in 1899 and came to Canada at 20 years of age. He was employed by Boardman and Co. in Acton. When war was declared in 1914 he left Acton with the first Battalion and went with the original first contingent to Salisbury Plain in August 1914. They went to France in February 1915 and fought at Ypres, Belgium in 1915. He was wounded there but after recovery in England went back to fight until near the end of the war when he was gassed and wounded again.

At one time he was being taken to officers including Major Lt. Col. Nelson of Oakville and Lt. Col. Gordon Brown of Georgetown. They were frequent visitors with him in Acton.

Among the flowers was a pillow from the Fourth Battalion Association of Hamilton of which he was a member with the battalion's crest in red poppies. Fellow veterans were among those attending the service conducted by the Rev. A. H. McKenry. Pallbearers were John McHugh, Tom Watson, Orville Brown, Gordon Rogavaldon, William Benson and David Dills. Honorary pallbearers were older veterans Fred Wright, Wilfred Colles, E. Barr, Johnny Moore, Patrick Ryan, H. M. Bennett, George W. McHugh, Lt. Col. G. O. Brown and Major A. J. Buchanan. Members of Acton Legion, under Max Storey, acted as a guard of honor. Interment was in Fairview cemetery, Acton.
