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European Trip is Shown In Slides, Commentary

The church service on Sunday October 16, was conducted by Rev. D. A. Powell, rector of Grace Anglican Church in Milton with Mrs. Ray Waters as pianist. Other welcome visitors were Mrs. E. G. Smith, leader of Girls' Auxiliary of Grace Church, and two of the girls, Christine Hicks and Charlotte Comber. Mr. Powell read two scripture lessons, Psalm 24 and part of Chapter 22 of St. Matthew's Gospel. As the text of his sermon, Mr. Powell read verse 6 of Chapter 33 of Isaiah. This verse contains the words: And wisdom and knowledge shall be the stability of thy times and strength of salvation. Mr. Powell explained that these words were spoken by the prophet Isaiah at a time of great fear and uncertainty for the Hebrew people and that Isaiah preached that the kingdom founded upon which a people can build is wisdom and knowledge. We have more knowledge today than mankind has ever had before, but it must be used to lead us to better things for all mankind.

W. J. R. Shortill, 77, a life underwriter, died suddenly last week at his home in Winnipeg.

Born at the Shortill homestead near Georgetown, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William H. Shortill. He attended school at Ballinduff and later Georgetown High School and graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College in 1911 with his B.S.A. degree. He was a life member of the Alumni Association of the University of Toronto.

Following his graduation Mr. Shortill was associated for a number of years with Ontario School for the Deaf at Belleville.

In 1918 he went west and joined the staff of Counter

Station Life at Winnipeg and in 1925 moved to Brandon where he was district manager for 14 years. Returning to Winnipeg in 1939, he continued with the company until his death.

While in Brandon Mr. Shortill was a member of the Kiwanis Club and was interested in many community services. He was a member of the board of First United Church and upon returning to Winnipeg became a member of the session of Greenwood United Church.

During the second World War he was involved in civil defence and gave his services to every Victory Bond drive. He had been a well known figure to the agricultural population south west Manitoba.
