This week a group from Orngeville will give us a sample


\$40,000 Building to Be Erected, New School**Retarded Children To Benefit Soon**

Meeting in Milton Tuesday evening, officials of the North Halton Retarded Children's Association and guests planned a \$1000 canvass for funds to build a new Sunshine School for retarded children.

Among the crowd were executive member Andy Miller, and Kinsmen representatives Sam

Meltzer from Georgetown, also Guelph and Milton and the present were members of area townships to raise the remaining women's Institutes and Junioring \$28,000.

Kinsmen in Milton have agreed to handle the town canvas in the rural areas. This year the association plans to set up a fund for a new school building to be erected on or near the Seventh Line, town, the Kinsmen Club is near Hornby. Also speaking will be Sandy Best, MP and Stan Hall, MPP.


