## SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

I was given the word today, from my wife, that my desk had to go or be cleaned up. So being a true sportsman I took the challenge and I'm now attempting to clean up my little collection of interesting odds and ends which I'll pass on to you and you can fill up your desk with these bits of possible sports information.

First we have a clipping that had given us the suggested size of shot to use in shotguns from 12 to 30 gauge for specific upland birds. Spruce, Grouse, Sharp-shin or Blue Grouse, Partridge and hand-tailed pigeons, shot sizes 4 and 7 1/2 are suggested. Hungarian partridge sizes 7 1/2 to 9 are suggested. Shot for woodcock and Wilson's snipe sizes 7 1/2 and 9 are suggested. No. 9 shot, 100 inches in diameter and No. 8 shot, 120 inches in diameter. Shot sizes are chosen for accuracy and killing power as does the size of a shell, so choose the right shell when you go hunting. You'll be a better sportsman and hunter.

Carriage for venison. This is a best seller, hung for a few days before being allowed to freeze, but should be souled off as soon as possible. Incidentally, the best way to treat good venison or any large game is to drap a carcass over the tender of a hot car exposed to the sun, salt and dry, turning the drive back to town, the flavour of the game depends on the care you give it.

Beaver Unleashed Near Downsview. Beavers in the Lake Simcoe district, which have, in recent years, been moving southward across the district are now being reported with the Metropolitan Toronto area. Recently one of the fur bearers was observed swimming in a drainage ditch in the vicinity of Downsview on Highway No. 401. The pelts of another was found discarded below Bloor Street in Toronto and conservation officers concluded it had been taken there in the past. Properly disposed of.

Apparently killed for me and handled and prepared the fur could have brought a few dollars on the market. But before you grab your traps and take off, better check with Bob Hood first, as it may cost you \$50 to \$100 fine to kill and sell.

Want to establish a hunting or fishing camp for you and the gang? The Dept. of Lands and Forests will upon approval issue a LAND USE permit for a site where you wish to construct a permanent hunting or fishing camp. The annual rental is \$20.

The buildings are subject to all municipal assessments and taxation. The land use permit is renewable annually at the discretion of district offices of Lands and Forests. Camps must be constructed at least 600 feet from the shores of any lake or large stream or river and within 400 feet of any municipal timber for camp construction must be done under authority of a timber cutting permit.

Land use permits do not grant exclusive hunting rights to any camp or group, nor do they prohibit any other person or groups of persons from hunting and hunting in the immediate area of a permanent camp.

Public access to such camp sites is not guaranteed... in other words, you build your own trail.

New game and fish club, using farming as 575 acre of rolling, wooded and reforested land, abundant with upland game birds. A lake and two ponds stocked with trout which attracts ducks and geese at this time of year.
