Potato, Beef Entries Place Well For 4-H

Three of Halton's 4-H Clubs entered in the Grain competition, and stood 9th, 19th, and 25th. In 9th place was Halton's 4-H Forage team with Judy Wells, Burlington and Harold Patterson, Milton. Ministers, Laymen Discuss Church Affairs at Retreat

"Does the church attempt to answer what we are asking?" Rev. Reg. Davidson, B.D., of Westminster United Church, Orangeville, posed to 80 ministers and laymen meeting in retreat at Hockley Valley on October 14th and 15th. The retreat, sponsored by the men's organization of the United Church of Canada, was held at the second of its kind in Canada.

Presbytery president Dave Aitken said the retreat was held to bring minister and laymen together for one full day of thought and fellowship "away from it all." It gave opportunity to ministers and laymen to know each other better. Its theme was "Is the Church relevant in the world today?"

Delivered Theme
 Jack Dawson, an Orangeville businessman, delivered a theme address as did Dr. Davidson. He organized eight discussion groups to consider these addresses and the church in general. Rev. Emerson Knowles moderated a panel discussing questions and statements prepared by the discussion groups. Jim Beatty spoke for a resolutions committee.

Rev. Gordon Wanless and Rev. Roy Newman led worship periods. A communion service concluding the retreat was conducted by Rev. Bernard Ennis.

Not Good Enough
 In his address, Dr. Davidson declared it is not good enough for the church to be a "goodness" in a world of sin. He asked what does the church say to sin and how does it define it? "Not just sexual sin, but just for goodness, just for power, just for security." While the church speaks of honesty and integrity, what does it say about the robbing of future generations of Canadians of their country's resources? Does the church shrink from condemning the world because of its own stake in that world?

Disabling
 Increasing unemployment shows the prosperity following World War II is rapidly diminishing. "We are oscillating between periods of inflation and recession with a bit of prosperity in between," Dr. Davidson commented.

The same serious recession is the first industrial revolution ever present today. The working class is assuming the seats of power, and it is now the church should be significant to labour and to management.

How Relevant?
 How relevant is the church in feeding the world, asked Dr. Davidson. Millions of people are dying of hunger. What does the church say about that? "God has given men the capacity for distribution of what they have. It is for men to come together, to live together, to share together. The miracle of feeding the five thousand is that Jesus made all the difference — that was the spirit of the Man and that needs be the spirit of world government."

New Conception
 Mr. Dawson in his remarks said the way a man handles circumstance exhibits the quality of his spirit. Jesus mediated to us His spirit. His truth gave a new conception of life in the family, in society and in business, nationally and internationally. His characteristic was that of self-revelation, giving us more insight and motivation rather than a specific guide to action.
