May Keep Old Police Cruiser As Auxiliary

A suggestion that the town retain the old police cruiser as a stand-by machine, brought sparks from Cr. Fred Harrison at Monday's council meeting.

Mayor Hyde said any bids received for the machine have been much too low, and he thinks that if perhaps \$500 were spent on the cruiser, it would make a handy second machine.

"If I had had any idea the police committee had this in mind, I wouldn't have voted for a new cruiser," said Cr. Harrison.

The talk has been that the cruiser is so good, he continued, and if \$500 in repairs can put it in shape, council should not have bought a new one.

"I've been misled down the garden path somewhere," he said, "and I'll be very cautious in any support I give to recommendations of the police committee in future."

When Cr. Wm. F. Hunter also expressed opposition to keeping the cruiser, there was a flurry of words between him and the mayor.

"You couldn't attend the committee meeting and said you would go along with anything recommended," said Mayor Hyde.

"The police chairman told me what would be discussed and I gave him my answers," said Cr. Hunter. "But this wasn't mentioned."

Cr. Kelly said that the cruiser discussion had not been planned, so he would not have mentioned it before the committee meeting.

"I don't object to a man changing his mind after a meeting, but it's different when he didn't attend the meeting," replied the mayor.

With Cr. Hunter protesting that he had missed only three or four committee meetings this year, Cr. Cass reminded council that there was no motion on the table.

"If we don't have a motion to accept a bid on the old cruiser, we'll have two machines, so no motion is necessary," said Mayor Hyde as the discussion ended.

Earlier, Cr. Cass and Cunn had indicated they favour retention of the old machine as an auxiliary.

Had Jewellery Stores Here and in Acton

A businessman who had a clockmaking and jewellery business before his retirement, Henry William Hinton, 53 Lake Ave., Acton, died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, on October 27 in his 87th year. He had had a lengthy illness.

Mr. Hinton was born in England on December 23, 1873, son of the late Charles Frederick Hinton and Mary Ann Ellwood, and it was there he married Lillian Mary Todd who survives him. They came to Canada in 1911, living in Montreal and Toronto before moving to Acton where he established his business on Mill St. in 1924. He later had stores in Georgetown and Streetsville, and returned to Acton on his retirement after the second world war. In Georgetown his jewellery store occupied the present Boughton Jewellers location on Main St.

A Mason and Oddfellow, he was a member of the Church of St. Alban the Martyr. The funeral service was held there with the Rev. H. Stokreef officiating. Pallbearers were Grant Allan, Murray Smith and Gordon Cooper of Acton, Fred Williamson, Streetsville; David Elliott and Cyril Greenham, Toronto. Interment was in Fairview cemetery, Acton.

He is survived by his widow, three sons, Henry, New York, Norman, Toronto, and Herbert Acton and one daughter Edna (Mrs. C. Burns) Toronto. Four brothers Arthur, Robert, Hugh and Walter are still living in England.

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- COOLING SYSTEM is flushed and checked. Thermostat tested. Anti-freeze is installed.
- IGNITION SYSTEM. Spark plugs cleaned and gapped. Distributor, high-tension wires, and coil are checked.
- FUEL SYSTEM sediment bowl is cleaned - filter replaced. Air cleaner is serviced. Idle speed and accelerator linkage is adjusted for winter driving. All connections inspected.
- ELECTRICAL SYSTEM. Battery and starter are tested. Generator regulator is checked and adjusted. Lighting circuits are examined.
- LUBRICATION. Crankcase is drained and flushed. Filter is changed and winter oil is added. Chassis is thoroughly greased. Winter lubricant is installed in differential if needed.
- BRAKES. Level of fluid in master cylinder is checked. Cylinders and lines are examined for leaks. Brakes are checked for adjustment.

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
