Expect 401 Open to Hespeler by Next Week
Highway 401 between Milton and Hespeler is expected to be put into use on November 7, about one week later than earlier forecast and one week earlier than anticipated about one month ago.
At the present time some paving work is being done at the junction of Highway 8 between Hespeler and Preston. This is the last section of the road in this area in order that Highway Minister Fred McCas can fulfill a promise made to fellow legislators.
During the last session of the Legislature the minister assured members from this section of the province that this would be able to use the superhighway to Toronto.
Official Opening
There has been an official opening of the new road, but it was learned Friday that the road will not be open until November 7. The road has been completed along the route to Hespeler, but the work is being done on the section between the two highways. A new asphalt surface has been laid on Highway 401 in this area, and it is expected that the superhighway on the road to Hamilton.
Half Cloverleaf
