### FLAMES DEVOUR OLD CAR

Flames finished off a partially wrecked car in a wrecking yard behind Georgetown Welding last Saturday night. The car, an early model Ford which had been partly dismantled was completely gutted by the blaze. It was discovered by Col. Ted Scott while making his rounds in the cruiser.

Fire Chief Bob Bonfield said the cause was not known but the wreckers had been working on the car with oxy-acetylene torches that afternoon. It was a matter of a few minutes before the flames could have engulfed the surrounding building.

### WHAT COUNCIL DID

### Order New Bridge Ann Street Entry

It is said on Ann Street, who have been concerned for some time about a bridge which is inadequate to take traffic into the city, will be crossing the stream on a new structure soon.

Council on Monday accepted a bid of \$29,041 from Hamilton Contractors Ltd. to erect a new concrete bridge over the stream. The bridge had been asked for from the town and the Hamilton tender was the lowest.

While voting for the new bridge, Mayor Stewart was president of the local committee's action.

"I agree that we need a bridge and I'm not opposed to the idea, but I feel the committee should keep council informed of what's going on. This is the first time I've known of this," he remarked.

Local committee chairman Walter Gray explained that the bridge had been designed for 200 tons and that the bridge would be replaced by a new structure at such a favourable price as good business.

The police department will be satisfied with new winter coats this year. Council will order a new coat for the Laramie Santa Claus parade which is scheduled for the year on December 10th.

An application was received from the Dept. of Transport for a total of 100 more parking spaces on Main St. and on Market St.

A meeting was held for Nov. 14th with a consultation officer of the Dept. of Labour to discuss the contract between the town and the National Union of Public Service Employees.

The meeting reflected the business spirit when three worthy directors sat in the spectators' gallery for a time.

Earlier in the meeting council advised payment to ten firemen who were injured to help the police force in patrolling the town for the night. Police chairman Kelly said that there had been only minor damage in town last year when a similar plan was operated, whereas the previous year, 40 men are estimated to be injured.

Some employees were also notified that they had to make a total of 37 men, or Kelly reported.

The girls' volleyball team from Georgetown District High School took six straight games to win the District Volleyball Championship in a round-robin tournament at the local High School on October 26th. Other teams participating were from Acton, Erin, and Milton.
