Boys of Christian Service Brigade of the Maple Avenue Baptist Church are celebrating Brigade Week November 13-20 with special group activities.

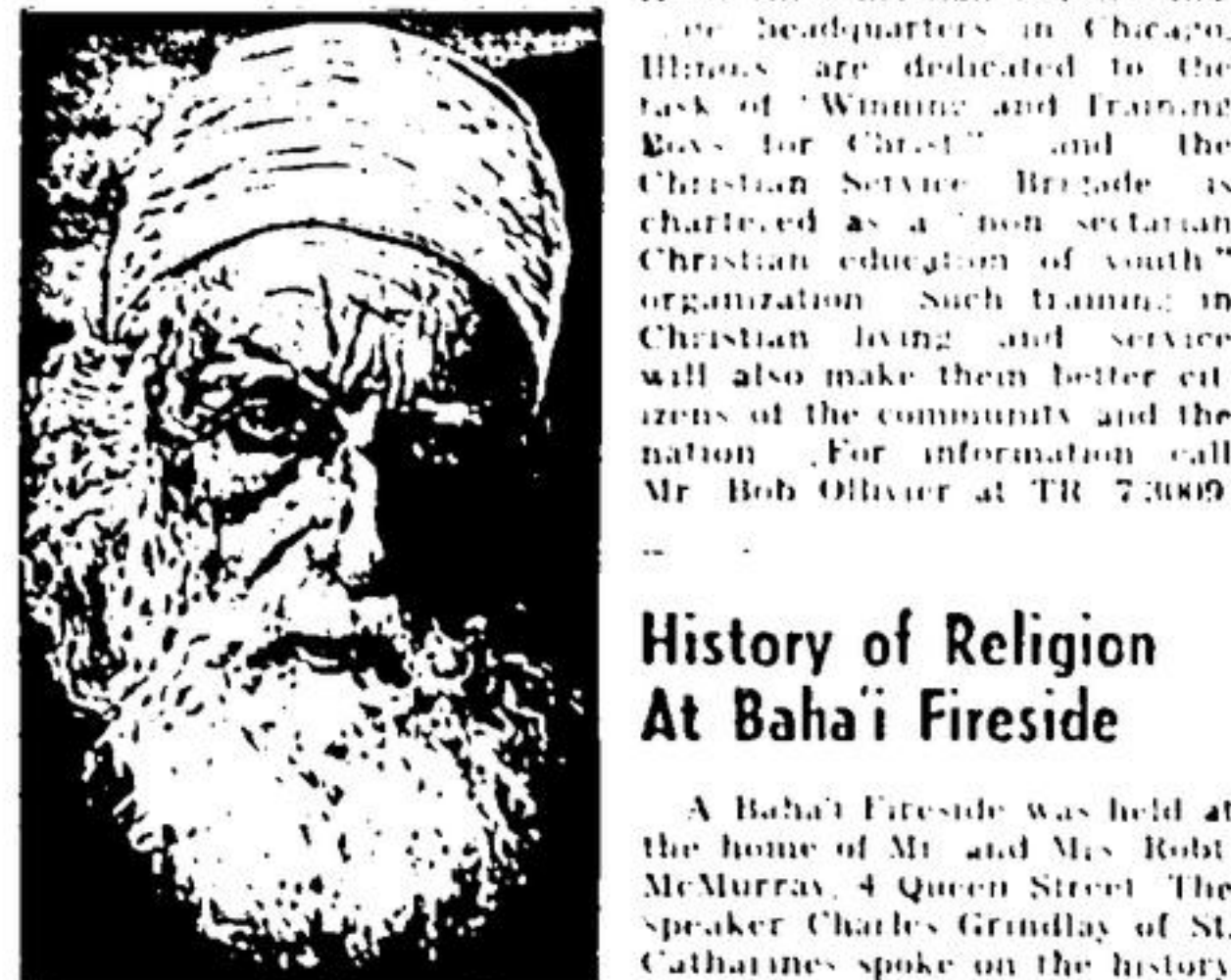
The boys are taking part in the Sunday evening service at the church on November 13 at which time special recognition will be given to outstanding members of the group.
