## Memorial Park is Dedicated Impressive Remembrance Service

Last Sunday's service was an impressive one, combining as it did, the Dedication Service and the Remembrance Service. Situated as it is in the heart of Georgetown's Park District, the new Memorial Park is a perfect setting for the War Memorial. As the dedication ceremony was originally scheduled to take place in October, and with the November 11th ceremony approaching, it was decided to combine the two.

The ceremony started with the padre of Branch 120, and chairman of the service, Mrs. Kenneth Richardson, announcing the singing of "O Canada." This was followed by the laying of the wreath by Mayor Ernie Hyde and Dave Capperand.

Mayor Hyde then requested the Chaplain of Branch 120, Canadian Legion to proceed with the dedication of the Park.

Mr. Richardson then formally dedicated the park and called upon David Capperand, President Branch 120, to unveil the Memorial Plaque. This was followed by Memorial Prayers and all joined in the Lord's Prayer.

Very appropriate remarks were made by his worship, Mayor Hyde, who said that he hoped the park would be used by all but as a sacred place, and not one to be taken lightly. He addressed much of his remarks to the children and hoped that they also would use the park in a fitting manner.

He paid eloquent tribute to the tremendous drive that Lord Harris had put into it, and that his personal and team's efforts went to the construction of the park.

Mayor Hyde mentioned the three living members of the town committee which first purchased the memorial. Ed Fick now of Milton, who was present at the ceremony, Robert Foulis of Brampton and J. A. Willoughby of Toronto.

His worship then introduced Lt. General Howard Douglas Graham, CBE, DSO, ED, CD, Canada's former chief of staff, and his former chief of staff, General Graham, who is now a practicing lawyer, and also a Queen's Counsel, gave an eloquent and moving address.

He spoke of the sacrifice of those who had paid with their lives in Canada's wars, and the many who had returned with scars on the bodies and in their minds. The General congratulated the town on the tremendous turnout and huge parade taking place in Georgetown at least. They were remembered.

The Honour Roll was then called of the slain in Canada's wars, followed by the Last Post, Two Minutes' Silence and Benediction.

The president of the Georgetown Memorial Association, Roy D. C. Fox, Minister of the Christian Reformed Church, ended the service with Benediction. This was followed by "God Save the Queen."

Marshal of the Parade was Myrie Reid, and in charge of the Town Scouts contingent, was Captain Earl Lane.

General Graham returned to the Legion Hall where he visited in the lounge of the Branch with other veterans unable to be on parade, and a number of decorated veterans present. He was taken on a tour of inspection of the building by the president Dave Capperand and other officials.

## BY-LAW No. 60-17 TOWN OF GEORGETOWN

A Bylaw to provide for the submitting of a question to the Electors of the Town of Georgetown at the next ensuing annual election.

Whereas the Municipal Council may make application to the Ontario Municipal Board for the division of the Municipality into wards.

And Whereas the Municipal Council has deemed it advisable to obtain the opinion of the electors according to the last revised "Act" list at the next ensuing annual election on the question of the Council making application for the division of the Municipality into wards.

Now therefore the Municipal Council of the Town of Georgetown enacts as follows:

1. That a vote of the Electors qualified to vote according to the last revised "Act" list of the Town of Georgetown shall be taken at the same time and at the same place as the next ensuing annual municipal election for the members of the Municipal Council and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold elections shall take the vote on the following question:

"Are you in favour of the Municipal Council making application for the division of the Municipality into wards?"


2. On the 5th day of December 1960 at the hour of 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon the Mayor or some member of the Council appointed for that purpose by resolution shall attend at the Municipal Chambers for the purpose of appointing and appointing in writing, signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the vote in the affirmative on the question and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the vote in the negative on the question.

3. On the 5th day of December 1960, at the hour of 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon at the Municipal Chambers in the Town of Georgetown, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given in the affirmative on the question and in the negative on the question.

Bylaw read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 13th day of June, 1960.
