REVISED SCHEDULE FOR THE RAIDERS

Because of the admittance of Oakville Oaks into the Central Ontario Intermediate A Hockey League the six team schedule recently published has become void. A revised schedule appears in this issue.

For those readers who might not read the same daily paper from Toronto that I do, might be interested in an article written by Mike Bolton on November 9th.

In his column Mike wrote about how some 1,143 deer died of starvation in a 50 square mile area near Renfrew, Ont. And 700 were found dead in the same area the winter before that.

Now even though Mike's column was directed to the Dept. of Lands and Forests and was referring to 50 square miles of land near Renfrew, we in Halton County have a situation of the same nature.

Though one area here consists of 343 square miles and the deer population is no doubt smaller due to its larger human population and the department involved is the Agriculture Committee of Halton County, the problem remains the same. Deer in numbers that might not reach 100 are dying each year in Halton County.

Study Winter Sports Effect on Heart Disease

Does participation in winter sports reduce the danger of heart disease? Research project being undertaken by the University of Ottawa with funds provided by the Atkinson Charitable Foundation is not expected to answer this question fully, but it should provide some interesting clues.

A \$10,000 grant from the foundation will go towards a study by Dr. Guy Motivier, of the university's Institute of Physical Education, of the relationship between physical exercise and the amount of blood serum cholesterol in the bloodstream.

Studies have shown that, generally, exercise does reduce the cholesterol level. However, most tests until now have been made in areas with warmer climates than Canada.

For his project, Dr. Motivier will use 60 human guinea pigs, all students of the Oblate Fathers' school in Ottawa. Thirty will be control group, carrying on with regular activities. The other 30 will have three 60-minute workouts each week at Canada's most typical winter sport, hockey.

"And they will really work," said Dr. Motivier.

During the testing and experimental period, the diet of all 60 will be closely observed and analyzed, as well as the serum cholesterol content of their blood.

Dr. Motivier, a science graduate of the University of Ottawa, pursued similar research while securing his doctorate in physical education at University of Illinois. His current project has been encouraged by Ottawa university's preventive medicine department, the department of physiology, as well as by a senior consultant with the department of national health and welfare.

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McMillan to Moscow With Chatham Maroons

O.H.A. president Ken McMillan will leave Milton airport next Tuesday at 4 p.m. on a trip which is possibly a "first" for a Georgetownian.

Mr. McMillan will accompany the Chatham Maroons, chosen to represent Canada in a series of hockey games in Denmark, Sweden and Russia. The Maroons were Allan Cup champions this spring.

The party of 28 will fly to New York, where they will transfer to Scandinavian Airways for a direct flight to Copenhagen where they are booked for a hockey game on the 33rd. The next day they fly to Moscow where two or three games are being booked in some of the larger Russian cities.

On December 5th they travel to Stockholm for other games. The three week tour ends when the party arrives back at Milton on December 11th.

Mr. McMillan is justifiably excited about a trip which few localites would have the privilege of taking. He is a former president of Georgetown Hockey Club and is in his second term as president of the Ontario Hockey Association.
