

# Hanging Sign Still Thorny Council Problem

Controversy over hanging advertising signs is still prevalent along Main Street. Some time ago, a new sign at Barrage's Cleaners which overhangs the town zoning by-law split council opinion about allowing it to remain. A charge was laid Monday the town solicitor reported that Mr. Barrage had been convicted of a by-law infraction sentence suspended and \$15 court costs imposed.

The solicitor said a letter should now be sent requesting the sign be removed, and if this were not done the town could either lay another charge or seek an injunction to have the sign removed. It was reported that a letter had already been sent by the town administrator asking for removal of the sign. "It's the only action he can take unless council does otherwise," said Mayor Hyde.

## Highway 401 Now Open to Kitchener

Another section of Highway 401 was opened today at a ceremony near Kitchener. This new section, stretching 28 miles from Highway 25, near Milton, west to Highway 8, southeast of Kitchener, will relieve traffic in the cities and towns served by the new highway and will make available to them all of the advantages of a fully controlled access highway. Trans-provincial Highway 401, when completed in 1963, will provide a 510-mile freeway across Ontario between the Quebec border and Windsor.

Hon. John Root, M.P.P. for Wellington-Dufferin and Munster without portfolio, was chairman for the afternoon ceremonies in the absence of Raymond Myers, M.P.P. who is ill with pneumonia. With John J. Wintermyer, M.P.P. for Waterloo North and leader of the opposition, and Hon. Fred M. Cass, Q.C., Minister of Highways, as passengers, Mr. Root drove a horse drawn Conestoga wagon through the red, white and blue ribbon and declared the highway officially open. Following the ceremonies, the road was open to traffic and many of the guests took the opportunity to drive the new highway westerly toward High the highway officially open.
