Councillor John Elliot has been at Arranger for four days last week attending the Mayor and Reeve's Conference on Canadian Civil Defence. The following is a summary of the report compiled by Mr. Elliot presenting in brief the recommendations and observations of the conference.

Observations
Until determined we are all subject to nuclear war for the next few years the danger is from manned bombers with two or three hours warning.

After this period we expect missiles with a fifteen minute warning.
A radius of twenty five miles of Toronto is considered a target area but fallout will drift to far as two hundred miles.
The Dominion Government trains instructors and try to educate the people to protect themselves.

Emergency Planning
Recent work and dramatic use of equipment.
A plan to continue to be made.
Government responsibility at all levels.
Army responsibility such as warning systems, police and fire direction.
Financial Assistance
Provincial Government grants.
Provincial government grants 15%.
On organization, administrative fees, travel, salaries, equipment and clothing.
Dominion government grants to equal provincial grants which is 15% each for Ontario.

Building Permits for October, \$65,000
The value of building permits issued in Georgetown in October amounted to \$65,348. From new Maple Avenue Baptist Church accounted for \$45,000 of the total, while a warehouse for the Canada Bread Co. adds another \$15,000. The warehouse is located right across from Avian Industries.
Wipeo T.V. and Appliance is building an addition at the rear, accounting for another \$5,000. The remaining \$348 was for residential repairs.

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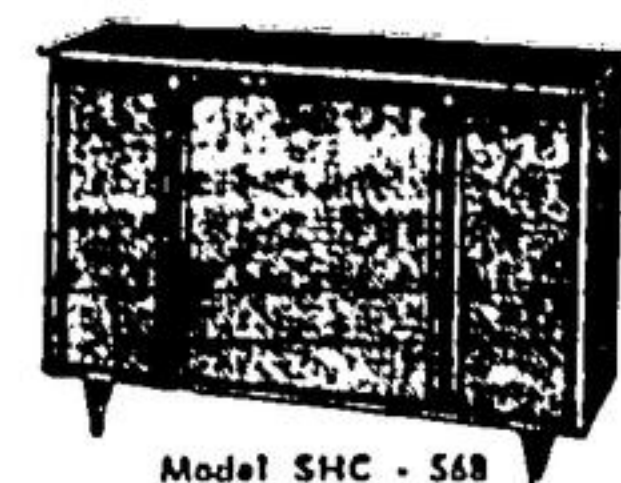
